PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 20—(AP) The Bonneville power administration in the fiscal year of 1948 sold nearly \$25,000,000 worth of power, an audit showed today. The figure is an increase of \$2,622,781 over fiscal year 1947 and \$1,523,692 greater than the wartime peak year of 1945.
