Wind Tunnel Tests 1,360 mph Speed

SEATTLE, Sept. 21—(AP)—A miniature wind tunnel which simulates flying conditions of 1,360 miles per hour at 80,000 feet altitude was reported from the University of Washington today.

The complete unit, in the aeronautical laboratory, is 20 feet long and four feet high. It has a test section only one inch by two inches in which tiny wing sections will be tested. Air velocity is created by four large vacuum pumps.

COMMISSION GOVERNMENT EXPLAINED

It is proposed that the Salem City Manager form of Government be repealed and all authority be placed in Three Elected Commissioners.

The First shall be a Mayor-Commissioner the head of the Commission of Public Affairs and Finance composed of city treasurer, city recorder, city planning commission, civil service commission, library and housing authority and all duties of mayor.

The Second shall be Commissioner of Public Health and Safety and in charge of Police Dept., Fire Dept., Health Dept., and Boxing Commission.

The Third shall be Commissioner of Public Works and Property in charge of Water Dept., City Engineer, Street Supt., Sewer and Sewage Disposal Dept., and Airport Dept.

All of the duties and powers of the city council shall be invested in the Commissioners and they are directed to reorganize the work of their separate departments to increase efficiency and reduce costs. They shall serve Four years with terms so staggered that at least one shall be elected every two years. The city attorney and city judge are also elected to act as a balance of power. All other city employees shall be under a strengthened civil service system.

It is possible that the elected Commissioners could save the people of Salem from \$15,000.00 to \$20,000.00 per year in actual cash or improved and increased services as suggested in the following manner:

1. The Mayor-Commissioner could absorb the duties of city treasurer which would release \$3,900.00 toward the payment of his salary.	Present cost of city managers office \$12,812.00
2. The Commissioner of Public Works and Property could absorb the duties of city engineer, water dept. manager, park supt., airport manager, with the majority of the details handled by the present assistants and chief clerks, thus making \$18,898.00 available for payment of Commissioners salaries and other necessary salary increases due to increased duties.	Present cost of city engineer 4,980.00
3. The city managers office being eliminated will leave \$12,812 more available.	Present cost of water dept. manager 6,318.00
	Present cost of city treasurer 3,900.00
	Present cost of park supt. 3,600.00
	Present cost of airport manager 4,000.00
	Total present cost \$35,610.00
	Less Proposed cost of Commissioners 15,000.00
	Total possible saving \$20,110.00
	Less allowances for necessary salary increases 5,000.00
	Total possible net saving \$15,110.00

The present system of government in Salem is autocratic, expensive and wasteful, as well as centering all power in one individual without any control by the people except as any control might be exerted in election of councilmen.
