The dinner will be in tribute to Frank W. Holman, a member of the Seattle bar, who recently was elected president of the American Bar association.

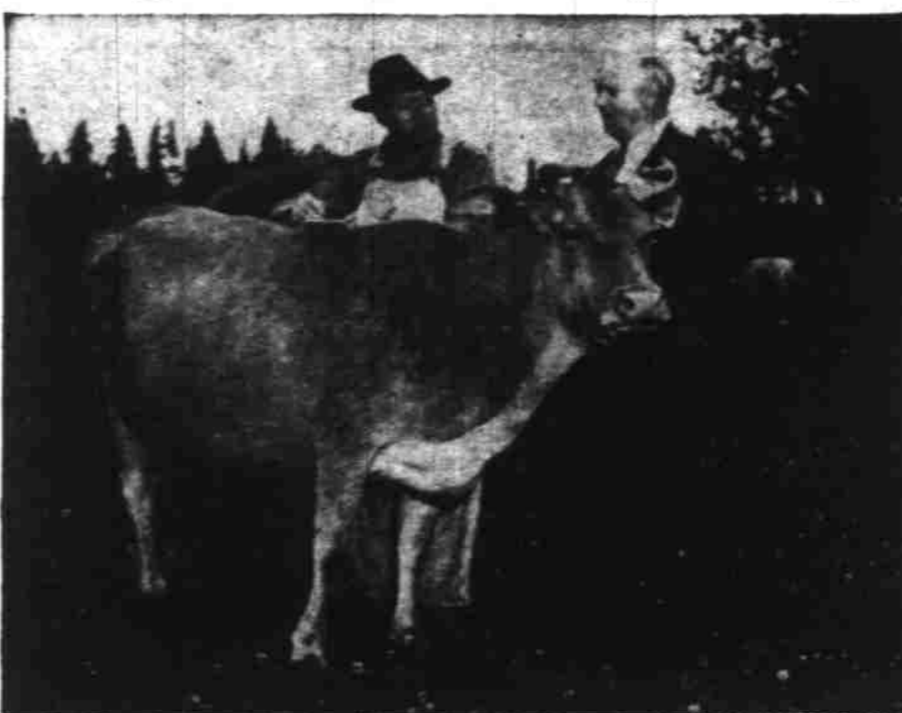
Holman is the first attorney in the northwest to be elected national president, Rossman said.

Jail Break Expert Sentenced to Year in Penitentiary

Roy Junior Robinson, pegged by police as a jail break expert, was sentenced to 12 months in Oregon state penitentiary Saturday in Marion county circuit court.

Robinson will return to the same prison from which he escaped on Aug. 14, 1946, while serving a year's sentence for robbery. He was captured a few months later in Wisconsin, but broke out of jail there while being held for Marion county authorities.

For the break — out Robinson was sentenced to 20 months in the Wisconsin state prison. On his release he was immediately taken into custody by sheriffs and returned here. The court ruled Saturday he must begin his old sentence over again.

Club to Hear Rev. Anderson

The Rev. V. F. Anderson, featured in radio religious programs, will speak Friday at 7:30 p.m. in Kingwood Bible church, West Salem, at a public meeting of the Salem Child Evangelism fellowship.

Anderson, superintendent of the Australia and New Zealand fellowships, will speak on the need of reaching children who attend no Sunday school. The fellowship's method, Good News clubs, will be started soon in Salem homes, it is planned. They meet after school for Bible classes.

Resentencing of Lebanon Man Set

Ray Barclay, Lebanon, sentenced to two two-month terms in the state penitentiary in Marion county circuit court last week on forgery charges, will be returned to the same court Monday for resentencing.

Since Barclay was taken to prison Sheriff Denver Young discovered he is wanted in Linn county on charges of passing worthless checks. The additional charge will be taken into consideration in the resentencing proceedings.

3 Industrial Fatalities Reported to Commission

Three fatalities, 1,874 covered accidents and 20 claims for occupational disease benefits, were reported to the state industrial commission during the week ended September 23.

The fatalities involve Hawley Catfish, Siletz logger; R. J. Luna, Portland truck driver, and Scott Heckart, Roseburg, mill yard foreman.

2 Cities Head Traffic Safety List for Period

Bend and Klamath Falls are the only major Oregon cities with perfect traffic death records for the first six months of this year, accident summaries compiled by Secretary of State Earl Newbery revealed Saturday.

Salem traffic claimed two lives in the period, compared with three the year before.

Neither Bend nor Klamath Falls reported a single fatality during the period, and matched an equally spotless record established during the first half of 1947.

Death-free at the midyear of 1947, Eugene, Medford and Astoria were charged with a total of four fatalities as of last June 30.

Detailed summaries of the traffic accident experience for each of the six cities are now being printed, Newbery said.

Oregon cities in the 5,000 to 10,000 class reported a total of six deaths against seven for the previous year.

Most notable reduction was scored in Portland, where deaths decreased from 33 to 18 for a drop of 45 per cent.

The state as a whole had a 9 per cent decrease during the period although total injuries and accidents were slightly higher than the year before.

Auditorium Group To Meet Thursday

Election of officers and discussion of the proposed Bush's Pasture park site are expected to dominate the annual meeting of Salem Memorial Auditorium association Thursday at 8 p.m. in the Chamber of Commerce.

The nominating committee will meet Monday at 8 p.m. in the office of District Judge Joseph Felton, chairman, to make selections. Rex Kimmel is now president.

Among committee reports Thursday night will be that of the location committee, which has recommended that the auditorium be placed in the large city park on Mission street. An ordinance bill to this effect will be placed before the meeting for discussion as to whether it should be placed before the city council.
