Restraint Suit On Guard Move May Be Filed

Reports were current here Monday that a friendly suit may be filed in the Marion county circuit court or the state supreme court to restrain transfer of the Oregon national guard headquarters from Salem to Portland.

The transfer, according to a recent announcement by national guard officials, is scheduled for early in October.

Sponsors of the proposed suit, it was said, would rely on a constitutional provision providing that "all public institutions of the state, not located elsewhere prior to Jan. 1, 1907, shall be located in the county where the seat of government is, excepting when otherwise ordered by an act of the legislature ratified by the electors at the next general election".
