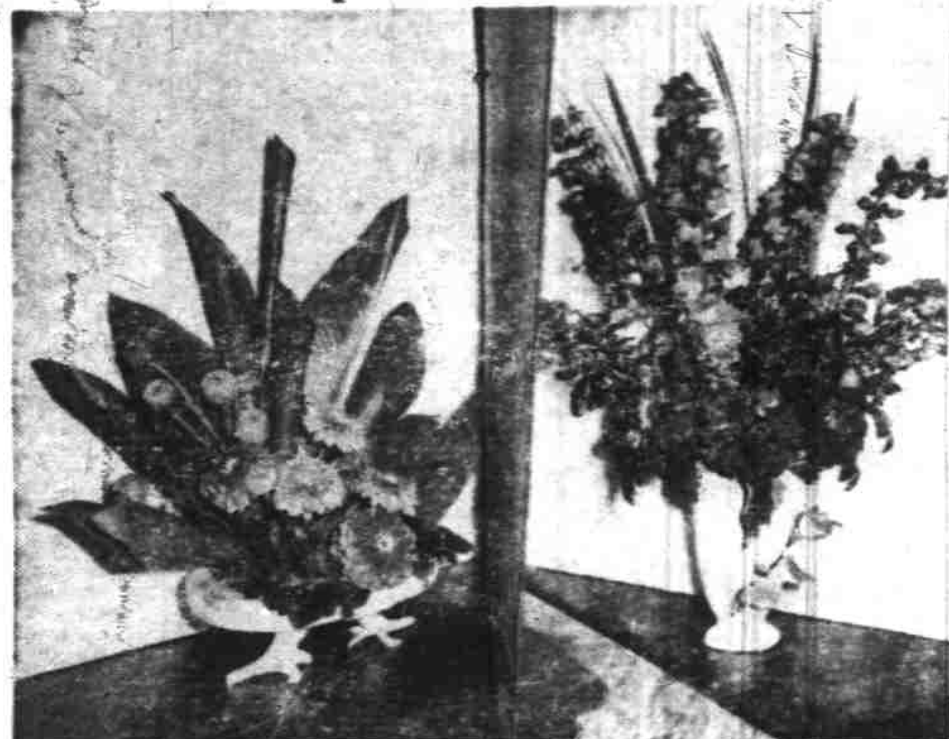


'Book' Sports Real Flowers

Oregon School Administrators Meet Oct. 18, 19

The annual conference of Oregon school administrators will be held in Salem October 18 and 19, Dr. Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, announced Thursday.

Administrators of public and private elementary and secondary schools will attend. Representatives of institutions of higher learning engaged in training elementary and secondary school teachers are also eligible to attend, Putnam said.

Putnam also announced that county school superintendents will hold an all-day session October 20 in Salem. Plans for school legislation to be introduced in the 1949 legislature will be among business to be discussed.

Both conferences will be held at the state library and state house.

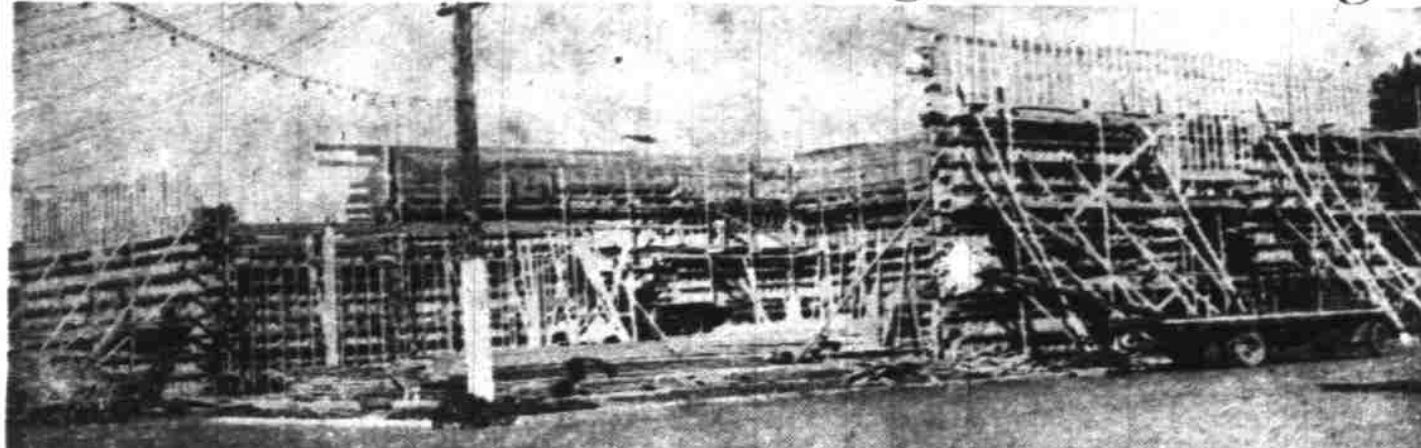
Local Candidate For West Point In Washington

Dallas Lumber Firm Erecting Store Building



DALLAS—Construction of a new 81 by 100 foot concrete building is being started by the Dallas Lumber and Supply Co. to replace the store and warehouse destroyed by fire last spring. The building, on the same site as the old at Mill and Jefferson streets, will be modern in design and construction with broken brick and glass front. Work is expected to be completed by the first of the year.

Ex-WACs Needed As Recruiters

Two former WACs are needed for active duty in recruiting offices in Eugene and Portland, M. Sgt. Thomas Massey, Salem army and air force recruiter, announced Thursday.

At the same time Massey said the army and air force has started a stepped-up drive to recruit veteran and non-veteran women for active duty with the WAC and WAF, women's section of the air force.

Enlistees must be between 18 and 35, high school graduates and able to pass mental and physical tests. Those between 18 and 21 must obtain written consent from their parents, Massey said.
