Recipe Comes

Formula for Tomato Cakes Given by Reader; Other Hints Are Offered

In a recent story about tomatoes, we mentioned that, though we didn't have a recipe, that vegetable has been used in cakes. Immediately we were provided with a recipe for tomato cakes, which, though we meant a cake to be used as dessert, this one is cakes, to be cooked on a griddle, presumably for breakfast. Here is the recipe which comes from Elizabeth Baker, 1647 Waller street.

TOMATO CAKES
Beat 4 eggs light, add 1 quart tomatoes and 2 tablespoons melted butter, season to taste. (I'd use a bit of sugar). Stir in cracker crumbs to make a stiff batter, drop by spoonful onto greased griddle and cook until brown.

More about tomatoes. Stuffed tomatoes add color and good flavor to the menu. Fill them with a combination of fresh corn and green pepper, sauteed together in butter and seasoned. Cook the tomatoes in the oven until done through. May use celery too.

An autumn salad that puts vitamins into the menu and pep into the person who eats them includes several raw vegetables. Cut raw cauliflower in bite-sized pieces, cut carrots coarsely and shred spinach, not too finely. Combine 2 tablespoons mayonnaise with 2 tablespoons sour cream, pepper and some salt. Mix lightly together and pile on plates.

Incidentally, fresh cranberries made their appearance in local markets this week. These are eastern berries, and the price starts lower this year than it did last. It's high enough, however. Local cranberries will appear in a short while.
