Linn 4-H Club Judging Team Tops PI Field

PORTLAND—Linn county Oregon's 4-H livestock judging team racked up 1785 points out of a possible 2400 to become the champion 4-H livestock judging team of the 1948 Pacific International.

At least five of the 53 teams representing three Northwest states in the contest were composed of girls; however, none of the all-feminine teams finished among the victors or runners-up. Members of the winning Linn county, Oregon, team were led thatched Leland Brown, 17, and a brother and sister, Jean and Robin McKinley, brother and sister, all from near Shedd, Linn county.

Individual high point winner of the livestock judging contest was John Moore, a member of the Nezperce county, Idaho, team that finished second in the team standings. His teammates were Martin Marke and Bill Wunman.

It really was a three-way tie for high point individual scoring honors, but the judges broke the deadlock on the basis of the reasons for placings given by the three tied contestants. Others figuring in the deadlock were Robin McKinley, 16, who was adjudged second and Bob Howard for Columbia county, Oregon, third.

Gold, silver and bronze Pacific International medals were awarded to the members of the three top place teams at an awards banquet.

The high individual of the judging contest, John Moore, received a camera for his championship. It was provided by Country Gentleman, farm magazine.

Jean McKinley, a 14-year-old brunette, is making her first appearance at Pacific International this year. She is no newcomer to 4-H club work, however, having completed six years. She is exhibiting sheep and one hog in the show.

Her brother, Robin, is competing at his second Pacific International and this year is showing six sheep and five hogs. Their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lyle McKinley, operate a 600 acre general farm.

Third member of the winning team, Leland Brown, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wren Brown, who operate a Jersey dairy herd in the Shedd, Oregon area.

Third and fourth teams in the standings were Columbia and Lincoln county, Oregon. Fifth place went to the Idaho team, representing Ada county, Clatsop coun-
