Prize Winner

Woman Who Won Fair Ribbons Has Some Ideas About Being a Good Cook

The old adage that fame is transitory is all wrong. At least that's what Mrs. O. W. Olson, 52-year-old housekeeper at Silverton has found. Fame continues to linger on.

Mrs. Olson is the home baker who took more ribbons than anyone else did for her baked goods at the 1948 Oregon State fair and as a result copped the highest home-making award offered.

Asked when she started to cook, she says she can't remember when. She recalls making cake when she was 10 years old and believes she baked bread even before that.

The prize-winning baker says she enjoys baking, is never happier than when she is stirring up something. But dishwashing. That is another thing. She hopes sometime she can win an automatic dishwasher. This year she received a refrigerator as first prize.

There are some things which Mrs. Olson does follow a recipe for. Her two favorite cake recipes are a sponge cake and a nut cake, both of which brought her blue ribbons at this year's fair. She adds that one of her favorite of all recipes is sunbeam rolls. Inquiry among her friends discloses that while "anything she makes is most awfully good, have you ever tasted her rolls?"

Mrs. Olson is quite modest about her cooking and expresses bewilderment at the amount of publicity she has received recently for doing something "I have done all my life."

The nut cake which took a blue ribbon for Mrs. Olson is one of the easiest cakes she makes. Here is the recipe: Cream well $\frac{1}{4}$ cup butter. Add gradually $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar. Combine 2 cups sifted flour and 2 teaspoons baking powder. Add a third at a time alternately with $\frac{1}{4}$ cup milk. Stir in 1 cup chopped nuts, 1 cup shredded coconut and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Fold in 4 stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in greased layer pans at 350 degrees F. for 25-30 minutes.

The recipe for the sunbeam rolls is simple, too, she says, and one wonders why there are not more good rolls when it is that

simple. The recipe is: 1 cup milk, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar, 3 whole eggs, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 cakes compressed yeast, $\frac{1}{2}$ to 5 cups of flour. Dissolve yeast in lukewarm water to which 1 tablespoon of sugar has been added, and allow to stand while mixing dough. Scald milk. Add sugar and melted shortening. Pour into large bowl or electric mixer. Add eggs and beat on slow speed. Add two cups of flour and continue to beat on slow speed. Add dissolved yeast. Beat 4 or 5 minutes on medium speed. Add enough flour to make it stiff enough to knead. Knead just enough to shape. Place in greased bowl and allow to rise until doubled in bulk. Knead down well and cut into equal parts. Roll out each piece to size of a pie. Divide into 12 wedge-shaped pieces and roll, starting with the wide end. Place on greased baking sheet with small end down. Brush top with evaporated milk and sprinkle with poppy seed. Let rise until double in bulk and bake for 15 minutes at 375 F. Mrs. Olson preheats the oven to 425 degrees F. then reduces the temperature to 375.

MRS. OLSON'S SPONGE CAKE

1 cup pastry flour,
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon cream of tartar,
 $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon salt,
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar,
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup water,
1 teaspoon vanilla,
7 egg whites,
7 egg yolks,
Pinch of salt.

Sift flour once. Measure. Add cream of tartar, salt, sift. Sift flour four times. Beat sugar and water without stirring to soft ball stage. Pour hot syrup over stiffly beaten egg whites. Beat constantly for 3 minutes. Add beaten egg yolks.
