

## Mother Ruled Guest in Home, Not Boarder

The state supreme court Tuesday held that Mr. and Mrs. Harry Hoffman, Tillamook county, were not entitled to charge board and room against the latter's mother who was living at their home as a guest.

The court upheld a \$1,170 judgment against Mr. and Mrs. Hoffman who were sued by Mrs. Mary Ibach, mother of Mrs. Hoffman.

Mrs. Ibach, upon going to live with the Hoffmans, gave them \$1,700 to keep for her in trust. The Hoffmans, according to the supreme court decision, returned to her \$600 but kept the remainder which they charged off as room and board. Mrs. Ibach then filed suit against her daughter and son-in-law charging she was living with them as a guest and not as a boarder.

Contention of Mrs. Ibach was upheld by the Tillamook county circuit court. The lower court was affirmed in an opinion written by Supreme Court Justice Hall S. Lusk. Mrs. Ibach died recently with the result that the \$1,170 will go to her estate.

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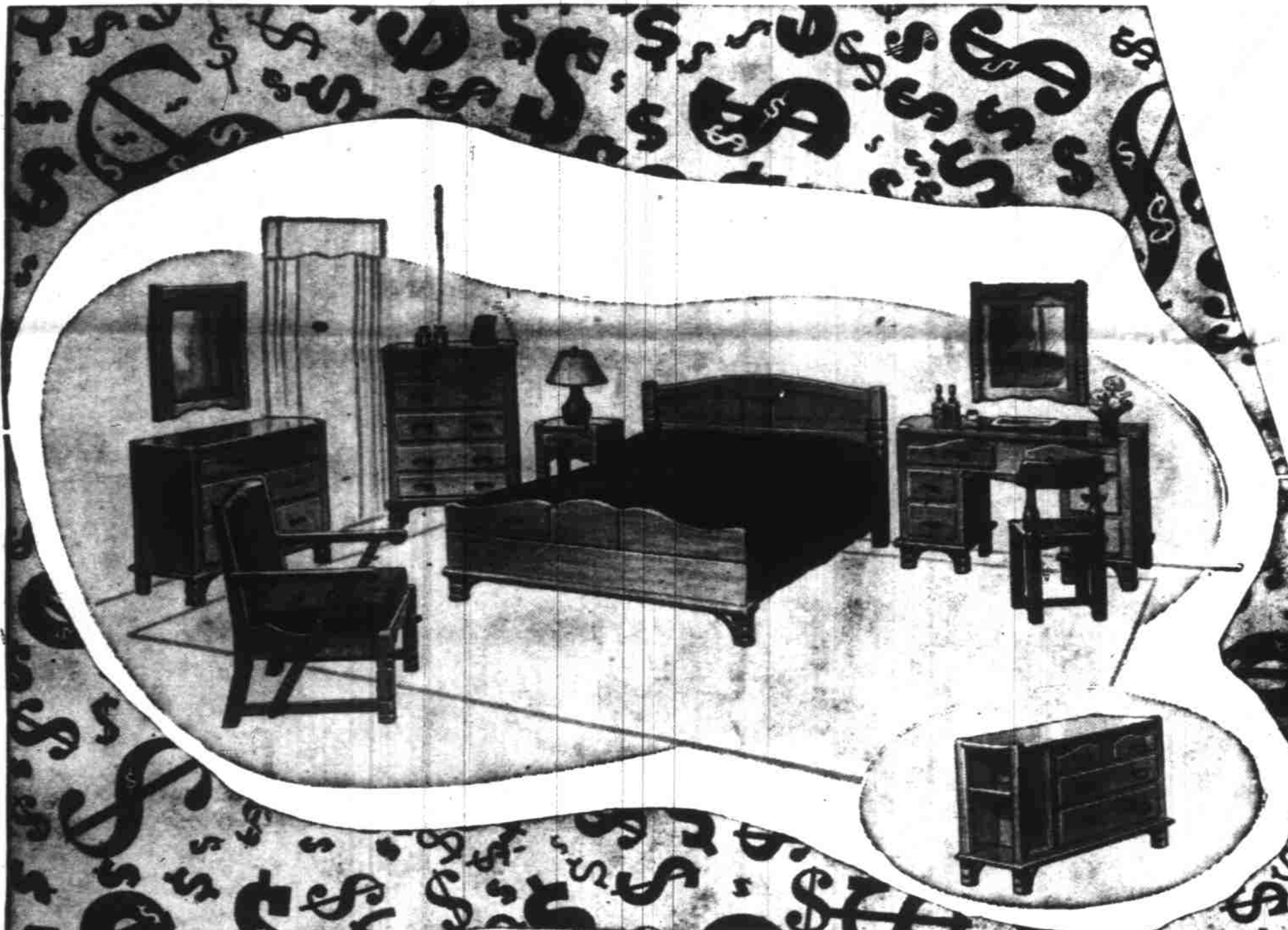
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
