

Recognition of Franco Seen As Drive Aim

PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Henry Wallace said tonight there is a "drive to recognize Franco Spain," and "I think it was all inspired by the military."
The progressive party candidate for president told a rally of his followers that Senator Guernsey (R-S.D.), James A. Farley, and Sen. Lucas (D-III) have all visited Generalissimo Francisco Franco recently—and that Guernsey came "racing back" to confer with military leaders.
"Watch this drive for the recognition of Franco," Wallace said. "Via that route will come great trouble for the United States. Franco was the messenger boy for Hitler and Mussolini."
The former vice president injected his remarks on Spain into a speech before a crowd of about 1,700 at Benson high school auditorium here tonight.

Pan-American Airline Requests Base in Portland

PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Portland will become a major Pan American World Airways terminal if the civil aeronautics board approves company plans.
A hearing is to be held October 25 on a request to extend Seattle-Alaska flights to Portland and Los Angeles, and permission is being sought for overseas passengers to fly in Pan American planes to domestic terminals.
At present, Portland passengers for Europe must use another air line to fly to an eastern terminal. The CAL already has approved Pan American flights from Seattle-Tacoma and Portland to Hawaii.

Storm Heads For Northwest

PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—(AP)—A new storm is heading toward the Pacific northwest coastline on the heels of one that swept through

western Oregon and into the Cascades today.
The storm, some 1500 miles at sea northwest of here, is expected to strike the coast late tomorrow night or early Saturday.
The earlier storm brought rain and winds ranging up to 40 miles an hour on the Oregon coast and 50 miles an hour at Tatoosh island. A few widely scattered showers are expected in the mountains tonight and tomorrow.

Pork Prices Fall, Portland

PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Tomorrow's day to buy pork in Portland.
A number of retailers are advertising pork on sale tomorrow at prices as much as 21 cents below normal. For instance: shoulder steaks, 58 cents a pound; loin roast, 59 cents; pork chops, 70 cents.
The cut reflects last week's \$5 a hundred pounds drop in the price of live hogs. Some veteran market observers added that they thought the peak price of hogs is sliding permanently downward. A bumper corn crop—providing plenty of feed for animals—is expected to stimulate hog production and consequently lower prices.

President Truman said last night that the 1948 political choice is between the republicans and "big business" on one side, and democrats and "the little fellow" on the other.
Mr. Truman drew the contrast in a speech for a democratic rally at Jersey City, N. J., while his republican opponent, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, laid plans to resume his campaign-touring next week.
The president's Jersey City speech followed another day of intensive campaigning in industrial Pennsylvania and New Jersey, during which he said republicans are scared to come out and answer him on the issues of the presidential race.
Republicans ignored the challenge, sticking to their strategy of choosing their own tactics and timing.

Smith, professor of economics at Olivet college at Olivet, Mich., is a nationally known organizer of labor and progressive movements. He is currently touring the country as running mate to socialist presidential candidate Norman Thomas.

cide, littered the beach near here today.

Townfolk tried to drag the 44 mammals back into the rough Atlantic but had little success. The live ones swam headlong into shore again when they were towed out.

High tides are expected to take some to sea but others, high and dry on the beach, will have to be hauled off by shrimp boats and other small craft.

The whales, traveling in two schools, hit the beach early today. Most died quickly as they were rolled over the sand by pounding waves.

10 to 12 Aboard Stricken Ship

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Oct. 7.—(AP)—The navy reported tonight that the Motorship Malibu, carrying 10 to 12 persons, was in distress in a tropical storm off the tip of Cape San Lucas, 800 miles south of here.
The Malibu, ex-British patrol boat now under Canadian registry, sent out an SOS, saying it needed immediate assistance, the navy said. Winds of 50 to 60 miles an hour were reported by the vessel.
The destroyer Henry W. Tucker was dispatched to the aid of the Malibu. It is not expected to arrive until Friday midnight. The nearest vessel is approximately 250 miles from the Malibu, the navy said.
The Malibu, a 112-foot craft, was en route to San Diego from Punta Arenas, Costa Rica.

Haskins Pleads Innocent To Larceny Charge

William Harvey Haskins, Salem route 4, box 898, pleaded innocent to a charge of larceny in district court Thursday and was released on \$750 bail.
Haskins was arrested by state police for allegedly taking 6,000 to 8,000 feet of lumber from the Navy and Marine corp armory building site on Turner road. Trial has been set for October 21.

Airport Tower To Be Used During Winter

Reopening of the control tower at McNary field by the civil aeronautics authority about January 1 was announced Thursday by City Manager J. L. Franzen. The tower will be used during the winter months when weather conditions do not permit landings at Portland and Troutdale.

Franzen said the local field is almost ideal for emergency use because the area is seldom fog-bound. "The control tower will permit almost any type of craft to use the field for emergency landings," Franzen said. "The expenditure of federal funds for this project is money well spent."

Franzen said it has not yet been decided whether the tower will operate around the clock or every day of the week. He suggested that it may be manned by city crews which would be ready for duty whenever operation is warranted. Wild said the CAA would pay the city \$1 annually for use of the facilities and would install air conditioning equipment.

At the same time Franzen announced that city crews have completed enlargement of the U.S. weather bureau's quarters on the east side of the field.

He said 25 feet of floor space was added to one end of the former quarters beside the large hangar and that several new weather instruments and teletype machine have been installed.

In the near future, Franzen revealed, the Salem weather bureau will set up machinery for handling flight plans—a procedure never before carried out at McNary field. When the new system is effected pilots of all departing planes will be required to file flight plans with the weather bureau and report in upon reaching their destinations.
