Ex-State Senator Donates \$75,000 to Tillamook YMCA

TILLAMOOK, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Former State Senator A. G. Beals and wife have pledged \$75,000 for a YMCA building and program here and asked the community to match the amount.

In a statement at a gathering of civic leaders to form a YMCA foundation, the Tillamook county lumberman and dairy farmer said he and his wife were both orphan children and wanted to provide for the county's under-privileged children.

Beals presented a check for \$35,000 to the board of directors and pledged \$10,000 in four annual payments. He asked that the community raise an additional \$75,000 in the next 90 days, in cash, pledges or equivalent value of land or materials, toward a building.

At a special meeting of the state board of higher education here Edgar W. Smith, president, and Charles D. Byrne, secretary, signed for the board, after approval upon recommendation by the building and finance committees. Ross B. Hammond signed for the Ross B. Hammond company, general contractors.

Hammond said the student center building will be completed in about a year and a half.

The board awarded a contract for \$1,900,000 in bonds to finance the structure to Blythe and Company, Inc., Portland, the low bidder.

Boilermakers Strike Spreads To Springfield

PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The AFL boilermakers strike has spread to Springfield, Elmer Williams, union business agent, said here today.

According to Williams, the boilermakers struck against the Mt. States Power and Light company there yesterday when the company failed to meet wage and other demands. They were installing a boiler for Wyatt & Kipper, Seattle, which had a contract with Mt. States.

At the same time, Williams announced the B & M Boiler company, Stockton, Calif., had met union wage demands and signed a contract for boiler installation at the Warm Springs Lumber company.

Meanwhile, the boilermakers have placed pickets on all major construction jobs here, except at St. Vincent's hospital.

The union is seeking a 25 cent hourly pay boost, a \$1 a day subsistence increase, and a hike of two cents a mile on the mileage allowance.
