Knows How

Housewife Has Set Rules for Buying, But Is Easy to Teach New Tricks

Women follow along the same line of buying generally, unless educated otherwise. And usually the women are pretty good buyers, especially of foodstuffs. They've learned from years of experience, and have inherited certain ideas from their mothers.

Take sweet potatoes, for example. Experience has taught women that very large sweet potatoes are not only wasters of fuel, they are less attractive to serve and have less flavor than the medium sized and smaller ones. Large potatoes must be cut for serving — one's too big for a person. Shops in an eastern state cut down the cost of the large potatoes 2c a pound, and even then the women refused to take the largest, selecting the smallest in that bin, leaving the remaining to the grocer.

Cranberries are in the market now, and indications are that they'll cost less this year than last. It's a little hard for most women to see anything in a cranberry except sauce, but growers over the country — and we have a good supply of the berry from Oregon, too, in case you didn't know — are trying to educate women to use them in other recipes than for mere sauce. That alone doesn't take care of the cranberry crop.

For instance, you can add some to muffins, with a bit more sugar in the batter, just as you would blueberries or huckleberries.

Then here's a recipe for

CRANBERRY CHIFFON PIE

3 cups cranberries
1 cup hot water
1 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 eggs, separated
1/4 cup cold water
1 1/2 tablespoons gelatine
2 tablespoons confectioner's sugar

Wash and pick over berries. Boil the berries in the hot water until soft and press through a fine sieve. Add sugar, salt and well-beaten egg yolks and cook over hot water a few minutes.

Soak gelatine in cold water and then stir into hot mixture until dissolved. Chill and when beginning to set, fold in whites of eggs which have been beaten with confectioner's sugar. Blend well. Pile into a 9-inch baked crust with a high rim. Chill.
