

Stock Market Slow; Price Changes Few

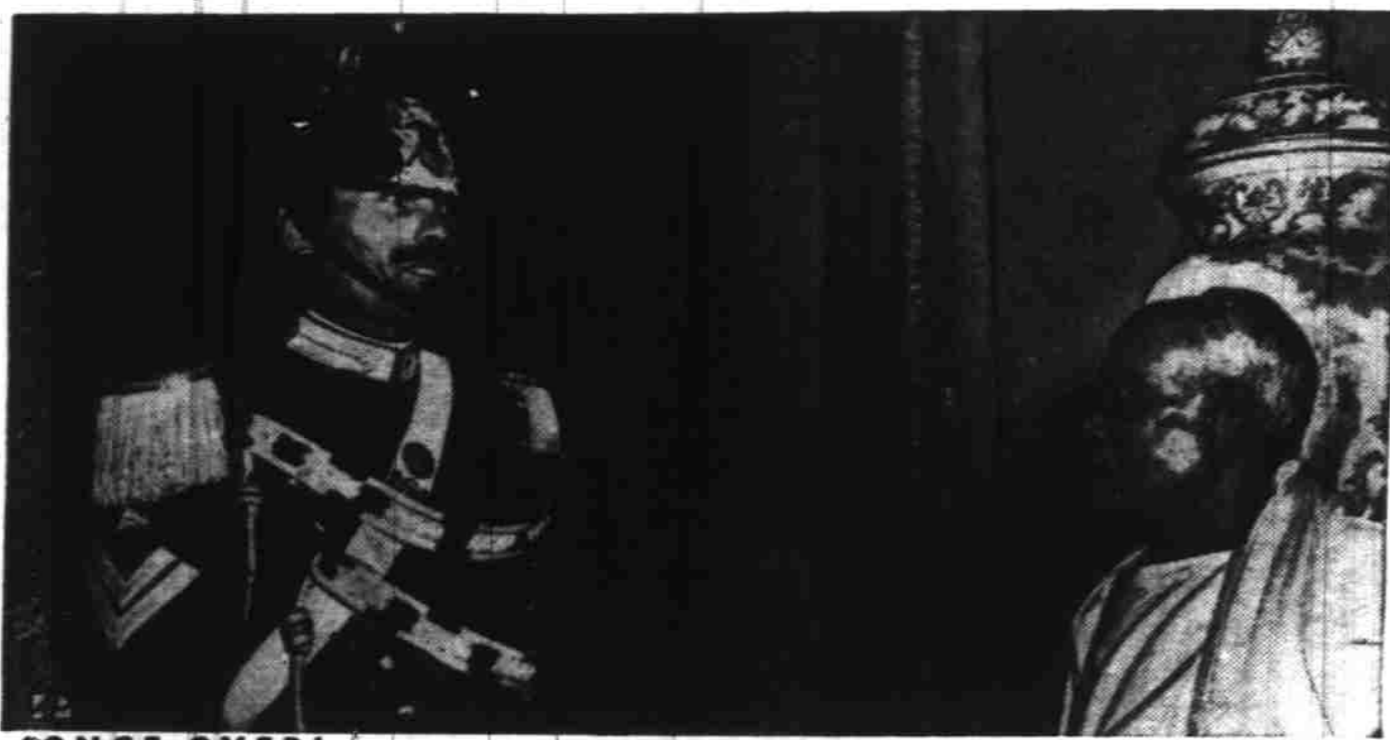
NEW YORK, Oct. 9-(AP)—The stock market rounded out a rising week today in the slowest Saturday session in five years. Only 190,000 shares changed hands, a low since September, 1943. Price changes were relatively insignificant. Many traders didn't go to work at all and those who did were satisfied to take it easy. With the foreign news a dominant factor in the market, Wall Street followed its usual policy of caution and avoided any large-scale commitments. A number of financial observers believe that some sort of compromise on the Berlin blockade might be worked out over the week end but until that happens no one seemed anxious to take an aggressive stand in the market. The figures tell the story of just how inconclusive the market was today. Not only was the Associated Press average of 60 stocks unchanged at 68.3, but all components of the index (which include the industrial, railroad and utility groups of stocks) were unchanged. Only 570 issues were traded. Of these 183 advanced and 186 declined.

War Memorial Association to Meet Tuesday

Election of officers, committee reports and consideration of a pamphlet outlining proposed plans will feature the annual meeting of the War Memorial Auditorium Association Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the chamber of commerce. The open meeting was postponed from September. Action is expected on the building committee's recommendations, as depicted in the brochure, and on the location committee's proposal that the auditorium be constructed in Bush Pasture park. For the latter a ordinance bill has been prepared, with the association to decide whether it will be submitted to the city council. The brochure prepared by the association presents the suggestions of the building committee—an artist's conception of the building, general specifications, a possible floor plan, comparison with other cities' auditoriums and proposed financing procedures.

Two Hunters Lost; Others Found Safe

LAKEVIEW, Oct. 9-(AP)—Two Florence hunters—R. F. Bowman and Russ Kimble—were reported missing today somewhere between their coastal home and the Warner valley country here. Bowman's son, 19-year-old Don Bowman, said his father and Kimble left Florence in a red truck yesterday morning to hunt deer near here. They failed to appear at a breakfast rendezvous at Oakridge, Ore. Meantime in central Oregon, two hunters turned up safely and expressed surprise they had been thought missing. The two—John Blomquist, 46, Springfield, and his 17-year-old son, Jimmy, said they hadn't been lost; just tracking deer.

Flowering Trees Bring Rat Plague

CALCUTTA, India, Oct. 9-(AP)—Forty thousand Assamese tribesmen are facing a near famine by an invasion of wild rats. The rodents are overrunning standing crops and destroying granaries in the area along the northwestern border of Burma. The invasion was caused by the flowering of bamboo trees, which occurs every 25 years. The flowers are a delicacy for rats.

Captain of Tug Believed Dead

PORTLAND, Oct. 9-(AP)—Tug Captain Francis L. Nunez was feared drowned in the sinking of his tug Multnomah last night. The tug struck a Puget island jetty and sank in 60 feet of water. A deckhand, the only other man aboard, managed to grab a life preserver, and was picked up by a passing fisherman. The rescued deckhand, R. A. Raybourn, said he thought the skipper was trapped in the deck house.

Total Lincoln Registration Over 10,000
TOLEDO, Oct. 9-(Special)—Voter registration in Lincoln county passed the 10,000 mark for the first time, a report released by County Clerk Robert S. Collins today reveals. An energetic drive by young democrats and the democratic county committee is believed responsible for the record breaking total of 10,301 registrants for the November election. Democrats edged the republicans 5,139 to 4,991, with independents, socialists, prohibitionists and miscellaneous accounting for the remainder. Highest previous registration recorded for the county was 1946's 9,400.

Chin-Up Club To Open Store
Oregon's Chin-up club has leased the building at 1275 N. Church st., to establish a state store, Beth Sellwood, president of the club, announced Saturday night. The store will sell merchandise made by the handicapped people of the state and will carry a light stock of groceries. Miss Sellwood said that the club needs an oil circulator, a candy show case, two plain show cases, shelving boards, a sink, pipe, an adding machine and cash register. Date for opening of the store will be announced later.

Duck Pinners In New Home
It was a grand opening time last night at the new duck pin plant which has been constructed on Portland road by Tom Wood. The 12-lane setup is completely equipped with the latest in duck pin installations and equipment and is rated among the most modern in the northwest. Wood announces that the league season will begin shortly, with a record number of loops expected to throw at the pins this season.

Canada Unit May Secede from IWA
PORTLAND, Oct. 9-(AP)—The British Columbia secession movement will come before the CIO International Woodworkers of America convention opening here Monday. James A. Fading, international president, said the convention would act upon the British Columbia district council's move in leaving the IWA for an independent Canadian union. Fading already started court action to freeze the district council funds.
