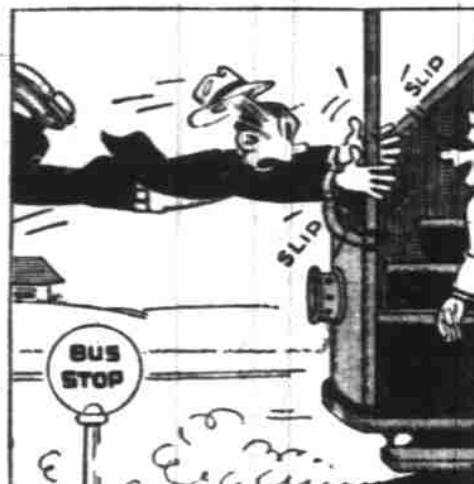

Portland Produce

PORTLAND, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Butterfat—Tentative, subject to immediate change, premium quality maximum of 35 to 1 per cent acidity delivered to Portland, 74-76 lb.; first quality, 69-72 lb.; second quality, 66-68 lb.; valley routes and country points, 2c less than first.

Butter—Wholesale f.o.b. bulk cubes: grade AA, 83 score, 74c lb.; A, 82 score, 73c lb.; B, 80 score, 72c lb.; C, 79 score, 71c lb.; above prices are strictly nominal.

Cheese—Selling price to Portland wholesalers: Oregon singles, 46-53c; Oregon 5-lb. loaf, 49-55c.

Eggs—To wholesalers: A grade, large, 63½-66½ doz.; A grade medium, 59½-62½ doz.; A grade, small, 45-50½ doz.; B grade, 42-48½ doz.

Eggs—Purchased from farmers: Current receipts, 50½-58½ doz.; buyers pay 3-3½c below wholesale quotations on graded basis for best henney eggs.

Live Chickens—Best price to producers: No. 1 broilers under 2½ lbs., 37-38c; fryers, 2 to 3 lbs., 41-42c; 3 to 4 lbs., 41-42c; roasters, 4 lbs. and over, 41-42c; fowl, Leithorns, all weights, 28-32c; colored fowl, all weights, 21-33c lb.; old roosters, 16-18c lb.

Turkeys—Prices quoted are net to the producer on a dressed weight basis: U.S. No. 1 young toms, 41-43c a pound; heavy, 39-41c; old toms, 30-31c; old or heavy, 15-18c.
