Brahama calves imported from Texas recently will be furnished by Clay Nichols, Lebanon cattle rancher, and several other ranchers in the area. The contest is open to the public.

The club also said that rules have been set for two other amateur calf roping events to be held later this fall and next spring. Shryder said he has hopes that the spring event may be staged at the new Willamette valley horse pavilion now under construction on the South River road.

Planners Study Road, Tunnel Bridge Plans

Bridge, highway and railroad plans for Salem's future were given a once-over by the Salem long range planning commission at its monthly meeting Tuesday night in local chamber of commerce offices.

There were these developments: **BRIDGE** -- Engineer C. A. McClure of the planning body reported the state highway department has queried recently about the proposal for Division street location of a new bridge over the Willamette river between Salem and West Salem. The planners decided to have a delegation before the state highway commission's November 3 meeting if the bridge is to be considered.

RAIL TUNNEL -- Remonstrances against the long-range proposal for a Southern Pacific mainline tunnel under 13th street were heard in letters from Mrs. Lester McLeod, 365 N. 13th st., and from five doctors practicing in the Physicians' building at 13th and Center streets. McClure told the commission rumors were circulating that the proposal calls for open cut in the 13th street area, while actually the plan is for a completely underground tunnel between State and Market streets.

ARTERIAL STREET PLAN -- Commission decided to ask the city council to investigate advisability of including a separate citizens' board of appeals in whatever legislation is drafted to cover the long-range plan for thorough street development in Salem. The overall street plan adopted by the long range body has been referred by the city council to City Mana-

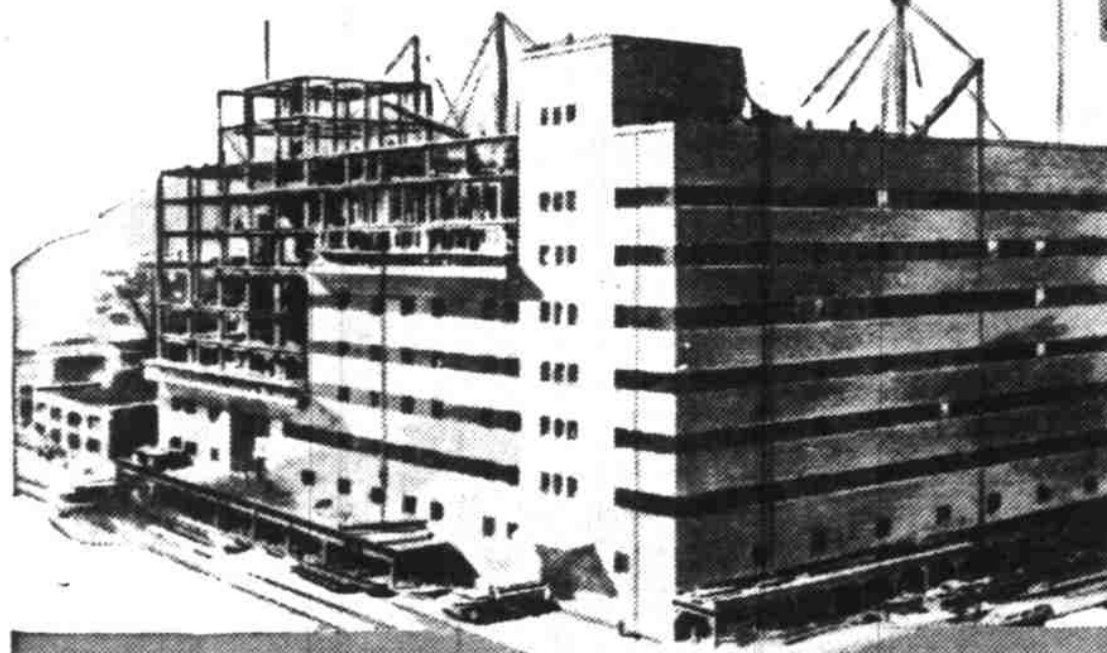
