BILL AMENDING LICENSING AND ACQUISITION PROVISIONS OF HYDROELECTRIC COMMISSION ACT

PURPOSE: Amending hydroelectric commission act of Oregon requiring commission to set forth the maximum rate of return and amortization in license; providing that state or any municipality can take over a power project at expiration of the original license upon payment of fair value not exceeding net investment; if not taken over, commission may issue new license under then existing laws or extend original license according to the terms and conditions thereof for periods of five years; providing further, upon payment of just compensation state has right to acquire project during any license period by condemnation.

REFERENDUM 306 CORRECTS THE LAW AND ENCOURAGES BUILDING OF POWER DAMS IN OREGON

The last state legislature corrected the obsolete Oregon hydroelectric law by making it read that the state or any city can take over a power project built under state license **UPON EXPIRATION OF THE LICENSE** (and not "at any time"). The vote was 70 to 20 to correct the law. Now the voters are asked to approve the action of their state legislature by voting **306 X YES**.

Eliminating the three little words providing that any new power dam can be taken over **AT ANY TIME** is the principal change provided by measure 306. The measure also corrects two additional sections of the state hydroelectric act. These changes require the license for a hydroelectric project to set forth the maximum rate of return which a power company may earn, and otherwise make the state hydroelectric laws conform to the Federal Power Act. The people's and the state's right of condemnation remains unchanged under the modernized law.
