

County School Boundary Board Hears Requests for 3 Changes

Three proposed school district boundary changes in Marion county were taken under advisement Thursday by the county district boundary board after a busy morning spent hearing all three petitions.

Largest hearing was held on a petition seeking to annex two portions of Bethany district to the Mt. Angel district. Other hearings sought to annex portions of Pleasant Point and Roberts districts to the Salem school district.

Approximately 60 persons expressed themselves about 3 to 1 in favor of removing the two areas from the east portion of Bethany district and attaching them to the Mt. Angel district. The areas in question lie just south and south-east of Mt. Angel.

Proponents of the move stated that they were sending their children to the Mt. Angel school already and so they felt their tax dollars should go to that district. They also said they desired a voice in the school district where they sent their children.

Those favoring the boundary change also stated they worked or owned businesses in Mt. Angel and that most of their activities were centered in that town. They also noted that the Mt. Angel school was much closer for them than the Bethany school. All the 15 school-age children living in the areas to be changed attend the Mt. Angel school, it was reported.

Opponents to the change said that such a move would give Bethany district an irregular boundary and that Bethany school buses would have to pass through Mt. Angel district areas to reach Bethany school children. Removal of the areas in question, it was stated, would weaken the Bethany district's school tax structure.

In the non-controversial hearings Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Berglund, Salem route 5, asked that their 90 acres of land in Pleasant Point district west of the penitentiary annex be added to the Salem district. They stated the change would allow their three children to attend Pringle school.

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Stout and

Chet Nelson, all of Salem route 3, told the court that if their 19 acres were taken from Roberts district and added to the Salem district their three children could ride a school bus to Salem instead of walking to Roberts school.

Alaska Barge To Carry Food

SEATTLE, Oct. 14 (AP)—The Alaska railroad said today its first emergency Alaska barge sailing from Seattle is scheduled for next Wednesday.

Officials said 2,200 tons of food and other essential freight will be shipped to Seward for distribution in the rail belt area.

Meanwhile in Tacoma, scheduled air and sea "picketing" by striking Seattle maritime unions was postponed because of fog. Strike officials said a plane equipped with a loudspeaker will "picket" the harbor when weather permits.

AFL longshoremen there have driven off picket lines of the CIO unions. The CIO group had been picketing ships in the harbor, contending they were diverted from ports where striking CIO longshoremen hold sway.

Yoshida New Japan Premier

TOKYO, Oct. 14 (AP)—The ultra-conservative Shigeru Yoshida became premier of Japan tonight for the second time since the surrender, but by too narrow a margin for him to hold any permanent majority.

A minority of the diet's house of representatives elected the 70-year-old Yoshida late tonight. He polled 185 votes to only one for any other candidate, the democratic socialist former premier Tetsu Katayama.

However, 213 members cast blank ballots and 67 were absent. This amounted to a warning to Yoshida of hostility by the outgoing democratic and democratic socialist parties.

The coalition cabinet of Premier Hitoshi Ashida, including those and minor parties, resigned last week in accepting "moral responsibility" for a government loan scandal.

12-Man Crew Abandons Ship

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Oct. 14 (AP)—The 12-man crew of the tunaboat America, ablaze off San Pablo point, 350 miles south of here, abandoned ship this afternoon, but were picked up by another boat, the coast guard reported.

The coast guard said a radio message from the fishing boat Mary Lou said the motor vessel Anna M. was heading for San Diego with the 12 men, none of whom was injured in the blaze. The Anna M. is expected to reach here Saturday night.

A coast guard rescue plane sent to the scene reported that the America was blazing but was still afloat. No other details were given. The vessel left here Tuesday, bound for the Galapagos islands.

Boys Fined For Assault

Fifty dollar fines and 30-day suspended sentences were assessed Thursday to two 17-year-old Salem boys charged with assault and battery in the Saturday night beating of two junior high school youths.

Roger Hale and Jack Merriam were given the fines in municipal court after their arrest Wednesday. Each was placed on probation for one year.

Proxy Bride Joins Husband

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 (AP)—Attractive Mrs. Danise Weiskopf Reid would rather keep her husband than a \$30,000 yearly income from her father's estate.

Samson Selig, Mrs. Reid's attorney, said today his client would "rather lose everything" than divorce Robert H. Reid.

Mrs. Reid is the daughter of Daniel K. Weiskopf, distillery executive who died last March. Weiskopf left his daughter the income from a third share of his \$2,500,000 estate on condition she divorce her husband. If she declined, he directed that she receive \$2,500 a year. The income from one-third of the estate is estimated at \$30,000 annually.

PORTLAND, Oct. 14 (AP)—The Portland, 57-year-old amnesia victim, found out today what the load of cabbage was all about.

Tessmer's lost memory slowly returned as he talked to a former employer who'd seen his picture in a newspaper. Tessmer is a farm foreman; cabbage was the last crop he'd handled.

Ernie D. Ruff, Hillsboro farmer, came to identify the amnesia victim when he appealed for police help in finding out where he lived.

"I can see a load of cabbage," the puzzled man told police yesterday, "but I can't remember what it is all about."

Tessmer said he had suffered periodic headaches since a robber's attack on him several years ago.

Carton Replaces Thumb on Scales

PORTLAND, Oct. 14 (AP)—Retailers can't weigh the carton along with the food, Municipal Judge J. J. Quillin held today.

The case involved a fish dealer who charged \$1.80 a pound for shrimp, but included in the poundage the weight of the cardboard container. That, said the judge, accounted for 1 1/4 ounces of the pound.

Mexican Farm Workers Dash Across Border

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 14 (AP)—Hundreds of Mexican laborers made a dramatic dash across the Rio Grande here last night, jumping the gun of negotiation between U. S. and Mexican officials for their entry into this country as harvest hands.

The dash apparently was well planned. The Herald-Post said it was started by a signal from a group of farmer employers waiting in El Paso.

The Mexicans waded the Rio Grande by hundreds, swarmed across the two railroad bridges linking El Paso and Juarez, Mexico. They filtered through U. S. immigration service border patrol lines, avoiding searchlights, and made their way to concentration points on this side of the river designated by the employers.

The immigration service said about 400 were caught and sent back to Mexico. But many more got through to be loaded into trucks, trains, automobiles and trailer trucks and sped to beet and cotton fields in Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona and west Texas.

The workers had been assembling in Juarez for days expecting to be hired for U. S. farm jobs. It had been announced more than a week ago that an American-Mexican team would begin recruiting the workers this week.

Hi-Y Training Conference Set for Salem

More than 30 Hi-Y officers and advisers of five Oregon cities will meet at Salem YMCA Sunday for an all-day training conference. It was announced Thursday by John Gardner, boys' work secretary at the local YM.

Represented will be all three Salem Hi-Y chapters and the Hi-Y groups of Dallas, Lebanon, Albany and Corvallis.

Speakers will include Dean Robert Gregg of Willamette university, Carl Greider, active in the Salem YMCA and Dwight Welch, a regional YMCA officer from Portland. Panel discussions and separate meetings of Hi-Y chapter officers will be included in the program on Hi-Y objectives, procedures and organization.

A dinner will be served at noon by the Hi-Y Mothers club under the chairmanship of Mrs. Bjarne Erickson.

Housing Authority Sued by Relatives Of Vanport Victim

PORTLAND, Oct. 14 (AP)—The Portland housing authority was sued for \$10,000 damages today for the death of Earl Wayne Hopkins, 58, drowned in the Vanport flood.

It was the eighth claim filed against the authority by the survivors of a flood victim. Hopkins' widow, administratrix of his estate, charged the housing authority with negligence.

West Salem Sewer Section Installed

WEST SALEM, Oct. 14 — City crews today completed installation of 650 feet of drainage sewer line on Sixth street between Rosemont and Senate streets.

The project was started about three weeks ago. The 12-inch line, extending almost three blocks, will relieve flooding in the large area at the foot of Kingwood Heights during the winter and spring months.

The installation was financed jointly by Polk county and the city, with city crews furnishing the labor.

Hearing Set on Suit To Bar Franchise Vote

Hearing on the appeal of the suit brought by the Portland General Electric company to prevent Marion County Clerk Harlan Judd from placing a bill on the November ballot here expanding the franchise privileges of the Salem Electric has been set by the state supreme court for next Tuesday.

The Marion county circuit court ruled in favor of the county clerk.

Briton Discounts Atom Bomb Value

LONDON, Oct. 14 (AP)—A top British atom scientist says Russia would be foolish to accept American proposals for control of atomic energy.

He is Patrick Maynard S. Blackett, professor of physics at Manchester university. He was a member of the British government's advisory committee on atomic energy.

Blackett says he does not believe the atomic bomb is a decisive military weapon or that "a quick and cheap military decision can be achieved even with atomic bombs in a war against a great power."

VA Defends Rule on GI Bill Flight Training

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (AP)—The veterans administration today defended its stand on GI bill flight training, which had drawn bitter protests from Oregon aeronautical groups.

The VA said it would go on considering individually each Oregon application for flight training to be paid for by the government under the GI bill. Only flight courses definitely connected with the veterans' professional or business plans are permissible under the law.

B. F. Ruffner, chairman of the Oregon state board of aeronautics, had complained that the VA refused to approve flight courses for engineering and forestry students. Such students, he contended, are very likely to use airplanes in their work.

The veterans administration said flight courses which are required by a college for a degree will receive automatic approval. But for unrequired courses to be approved, the individual must prove them justified in his particular case.

Hunter Charged With Pointing Gun

HEPPNER, Oct. 14 (AP)—Orbie Rivers, 28, Umatilla, was in jail today on a charge of pointing a gun at a person.

The bullet struck John McNabb, 25, Umatilla, in the leg last Sunday. McNabb was deer hunting in the government springs area of Morrow county.

Rivers' case will go before the grand jury next month.
