Miss Alice Goffrier, president of the Baptist Youth of the church, will be toastmistress. She graduated from the Bible Institute of Los Angeles last year.

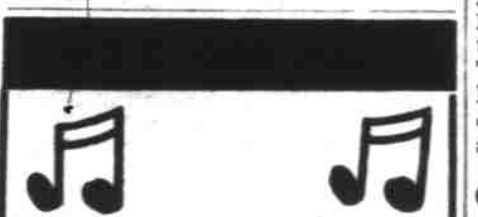

Sisters Wed at Double Rites

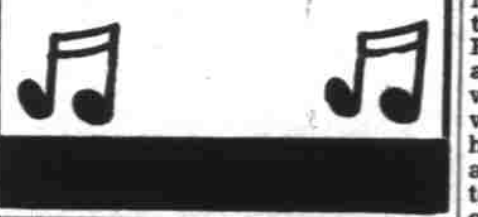

Old Style

Favorite Recipes Worth Recalling For Family or Company Dinners

Often, in the excitement of finding new recipes, we forget the old. Take cottage pudding for instance. Inexpensive enough to serve the family, it's nice enough for company. You can vary the sauce so often, you'd never recognize it as the same basic recipe from one day to another.

COTTAGE PUDDING
1/4 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg well beaten
1/2 cup milk
1 1/2 cups flour
1 1/2 teaspoons double acting or 2 teaspoons tartaric baking powder.

Cream shortening and sugar, add egg then remaining ingredients, beat in an 8x8 pan. Sauce will vary. Use lemon, a vanilla custard sauce, hard sauce, or fresh fruit. You can put apples on the bottom and make it an upside down affair too.

Another old-time favorite is floating island, you know the kind, a boiled custard topped with little islands of meringue and each centered with a bit of red jelly? Then there's another inexpensive dessert that's in the old time cookbooks.

Idanha Mill Prepared for Winter Work

IDANHA, Oct. 15 — With two new additions and extensive "cold-decking," the Idanha Lumber company is prepared for expanded and all-winter operations, according to Huber Ray, manager.

A new dry kiln, which holds 60,000 board feet of lumber, has been in operation for the past two weeks. It adds three men to the 45 employees in the mill and the 30 in the woods.

Installation has been completed of a new planer, and it is expected to be in use within a few days.

The mill, built in 1936, is turning out approximately 50,000 board feet of lumber daily. It has an estimated 3,500,000 feet of logs in "cold deck," in order to maintain mill operations during the coming winter months when logging is impossible.

The nearby veneer mill of M&M Plywood company of Portland has in excess of 5,000,000 feet of logs in cold deck.
