

West Salem City Meet Called To Discuss Issues, Candidates

WEST SALEM, Oct. 16 (Special)—A special meeting of the West Salem city council will be held in the city hall auditorium next Friday to permit "full discussion of issues and candidacies," it was announced today by Mayor Walter Musgrave.

Musgrave said the meeting would be conducted along the line of a debate.

Deadline for candidates' filing is October 22.

West Salem at the general election is a choose a mayor, three councilmen, a city recorder and a city treasurer. So far, no opposition has developed to Recorder R. F. Pattison and Treasurer Thelma Brown, neither of whom has filed.

There are, in effect, two tickets for the other offices. Mayor Musgrave, who has filed to succeed himself, and three men who have filed for the city council—L. F. Sheridan, C. A. Rust and A. N. Copenhaver—comprise one of them. In opposition are W. C. Heise, candidate for mayor, and three incumbent councilmen who seek re-election—Donald Kuhn, Roy Stevens and Dr. A. F. Goffrier.

Henry Wallace In Michigan

DETROIT, Oct. 16 (P)—Henry A. Wallace, the progressive party presidential candidate, landed at the city airport tonight to open a one-day campaign swing through Michigan.

A crowd of between 50 to 75 persons stood in the drizzling rain to await the arrival of Wallace's chartered plane from Dalton, Ga.

The progressive party candidate was also met by his sister Mrs. Angus McWay of Birmingham, Mich.

Wallace will meet with labor groups from Michigan, Ohio, Illinois and Indiana tomorrow morning.

He will then fly to Flint for a speech before the Ebenezer M.E. church and a talk in the Flint armory at 4 p.m. (EST).

Wallace will return to Detroit for a Sunday night rally.

Dock Deadlock Said Hopeless By CIO Chiefs

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 16 (P)—Two national CIO leaders seeking settlement of the 45-day old West Coast maritime strike gave up today.

CIO Vice President Allan Haywood, who came here on orders from CIO President Philip Murray, said he saw no way of breaking the deadlock. No more peace talks have been scheduled, he reported as he prepared to return east with R. J. Thomas, his assistant.

"The employers are adamant—they will not deal with Harry Bridges," Haywood said.

Haywood and Thomas were reported to have offered to guarantee union contracts if the shipping companies dropped their insistence that Bridges and other union leaders sign non-communist affidavits.

The employers apparently felt the guarantees were insufficient. The waterfront tieup began September 2.

Check Passer Pleads Guilty

Kenneth Raymond McGary, Salem parolee arrested by city detectives Friday on a charge of attempting to pass a forged check, pleaded guilty in Marion county district court Saturday and was bound over to the grand jury.

He is being held in the county jail in lieu of \$1,000 bail on a specific charge of attempting to utter a forged instrument.

Police said McGary walked into the Roen Typewriter company Friday afternoon and had a blank check stamped by a check writing machine he pretended he was interested in purchasing. He was arrested 30 minutes later after attempting to pass the check in a Salem restaurant.

Police records show McGary was sentenced recently to two years in prison on a check charge in Benton county. He was paroled, however, before beginning the sentence.

Small Powers Ask 'New Deal' In U.N. Set-Up

PARIS, Oct. 16 (P)—Delegates from the small powers say they want a new deal for the United Nations now. They are deeply worried that the everlasting clashes between Russia and the western powers eventually may wreck the U.N.

What the little fellows want above all is for Russia, the United States, Britain, France and China to make peace among themselves and start all over again.

Caught between the squabbles constantly involving Russia and the other big powers, they are about ready to admit the U.N. can't function if their big brothers will not cooperate with each other.

In the early days of the U.N. the United States and Britain took it on the chin from the Russians time after time, hoping that the Soviet delegates would stop and settle down.

Counter-Attack Started
Now it is apparent they have decided to counter-attack each time and, in fact, to carry the fight in U.N. committees to the Russians.

In brief, the U.S. and Britain are not taking it any more—they are dishing it out.

The third assembly of the U.N. ended its fourth week today without a major accomplishment.

The Russians and the western powers go from committee to committee in a continual fight.

The consensus is that the assembly will do what it can by mid-December, adjourn in time for everyone to get home by Christmas, and leave a lot of headaches for another day.

Dangerous Issues

The Berlin impasse and the disagreement on atomic energy are the two most dangerous issues for the U.N.

There is considerable feeling among several of the small and medium countries that the United States, Britain and France never should have put the Berlin case up to the security council.

That does not mean they are deserting the western cause. It means, the delegates say, that Berlin is obviously a four-power row and should be settled among the four powers.

Passenger Dies as Car Hits Parked Truck

Louis S. Bonney, Marion county deputy sheriff since April, 1947, resigned Saturday to devote full time to his studies at Willamette university law school. Sheriff Dever Young announced.

Bonney's resignation will be effective Monday, Young stated. He has been in charge of the night shift. Young said no one has been selected to fill the vacancy.

SOCE Defeats 'Frisco State

ASHLAND, Ore., Oct. 16 (P)—Southern Oregon college pushed across two second quarter touchdowns and then two more in the last quarter to defeat San Francisco State 26 to 7 here tonight.

Chuck Jandreau scored the first from the five and Gil Giovannetti recovered a punting fumble by Fullback John Krolek behind the San Francisco State goal line for the second. Gale Jones converted both extra points. The States only score was in the fourth with Lowart passing to Bell and Krolek going over and Desalerno kicking the point.

Southern Oregon's others came as Jandreau passed to Jerry Edwards and after a pass interception.

Pilots Ripped By COP Crew

STOCKTON, Calif., Oct. 16 (P)—The undefeated College of the Pacific tigers swarmed over an undisciplined Portland university eleven here tonight for a 61 to 15 victory.

The Tigers scored two touchdowns in each of the first, third and fourth quarters and made three in the second period. Portland tallied nine points in the first period on a safety and a touchdown and picked up another touchdown on a forward pass two seconds before the game ended.

Pacific Coach Larry Siemerling used 42 men. The touchdowns were made by several different members of the backfield. Two were made on intercepted passes, one on a forward pass and six on running plays.

Tree-Shaking Ill-Advised in New Nut Crop

While the 1948 walnut outlook is anything but rosy, if premature shaking of the trees is not done, some of the crop may mature sufficiently to make a comparatively good quality nut, J. J. Gallagher said Saturday night in reference to the heavy walnut loss experienced this week through excessive moisture content.

Experienced nut men say, Gallagher pointed out, that nuts are ready to harvest about 75 days after they start to harden. This would bring the nuts up to October 25 for normal harvesting. From 15 to 20 per cent of the 1948 crop has already been received at the Salem plant, and while they look excellent when received, their shrinkage is such that they are practically a total loss so far as in-shell nuts are concerned. The only salvage will be such as can be obtained by cracking and extracting the meats.

With labor what it is, growers will gain very little over handling charges from the 150 tons processed in the Salem plant up to Friday night, Gallagher thought. He explained that when nuts in the shell cannot meet the commercial grades set up by the department of agriculture all there is left to do is to crack them and that is what will be done with the deliveries received up to Saturday.

Moisture Content
One of the serious factors this year is the moisture content, Gallagher added. Nuts delivered this week have been carrying from 50 to 70 per cent water as compared with a normal moisture content of from 30 to 35 per cent.

Since growers have found the appearance of their walnuts normal before drying, John Trunk, general manager of the Northwest Nut Growers at Dundee, suggested the following pre-harvest tests:

1. Go into the walnut orchard and pick from a large number of trees scattered through the orchard at least 100 pounds of walnuts. Be sure these are thoroughly representative of the production throughout the plantings.

2. Take these walnuts to a drier where careful records of the green weight should be made. The nuts should then be washed and thoroughly dried.

3. Remove the nuts from the drier, weigh them and check the percentage of moisture loss or shrinkage.

4. Shell the entire lot and weigh the resulting meats to determine the percentage of yield.

5. Grade the walnut meats into commercial classes such as light halves and pieces, light amber

halves, two pieces, standard, number halves and pieces, mold, shrunken kernels suitable for slicing or grinding and shrivel unfit for anything but stock feed.

To Provide Assistance
Trunk further stated that Northwest Nut Growers will provide all possible assistance in making the cracking tests for their grower members, but he could not guarantee that the association facilities will be adequate to keep up with the work. The nuts must be thoroughly dried before being brought to the Northwest Nut Growers' shelling plant at Dundee as Northwest Nut Growers has no washing or drying facilities.

After the nuts are shelled and the meats classified, association personnel will attempt to help grower members decide if the walnuts have sufficient value for shelling or for processing in-shell.

French Move To Partially Devalue Franc

PARIS, Oct. 16 (P)—France announced officially tonight what amounts to partial devaluation of the franc.

A finance ministry communique said henceforth all imports and exports will be calculated monthly on the basis of a medium rate between the pegged rate of 214 francs and the free market rate of 313 francs to the dollar.

This would mean, for example, that trading Monday will be figured on the rate of 264 francs to the dollar.

(In Washington, the international monetary fund approved the new French currency formula, which simplifies the present "multiple currency" system in France. It was pointed out this formula makes the dollar exchange rate the key for computing the French exchange rate with all other currencies. (In London, the British treasury said the French step is a "welcome move towards a more uniform system of rates in France.")

Pegging the new fixed rate at 264 francs will change parities of all monies not quoted on the free market. Only the dollar, the Swiss franc and the Portuguese escudo have been quoted on this market.

High Explosive Bombs Found Near Peru Palace

LIMA, Peru, Oct. 16 (P)—Peruvian authorities said today 28 high explosive bombs were found on the roofs of two Lima hotels opposite the government palace.

Police discovered them while searching for explosives hoarded prior to the abortive October 3 insurrection at Callao, Lima's port.

Pole Declares Military Halted Vinson Mission

PARIS, Oct. 16 (P)—A Soviet bloc delegate charged today in the United Nations that a military clique stopped President Truman from sending a special peace envoy to Moscow.

Julius Katz-Suchy of Poland said President Truman was "a prisoner of a military clique." He apparently referred to Secretary of State Marshall's recommendation against the president's plan to send Chief Justice Vinson to the Kremlin for direct talks about the atomic control stalemate.

President Truman cancelled the plans after conferring with Marshall, former army chief of staff. In his speech before the assembly disarmament subcommittee, Katz-Suchy called for a halt to what he called Americans interfering in Europe.

The next move was awaited on the blocked Soviet Security Council nations on the security council met privately and their spokes-

man, Argentina, Foreign Minister Juan A. Bramuglia, planned to confer again with Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky.

Bramuglia, acting council president, was reported hopeful that Vishinsky would state the Russian position on Berlin in writing when the council meets again Tuesday. Yesterday Vishinsky accused the neutrals of trying to trap him into breaking his boycott on the debate by asking him questions about the Berlin blockade. He refused to reply.

Half Pedestrian Deaths Occur in Rural Areas

Accident records show that for the first six months of this year 19 out of 40 pedestrians killed in traffic met death in rural or unincorporated areas, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry reported Saturday.

Three out of every four pedestrians killed in the first six months were under 15 or over 60 years of age.
