Albany Woman Hurt in Wreck

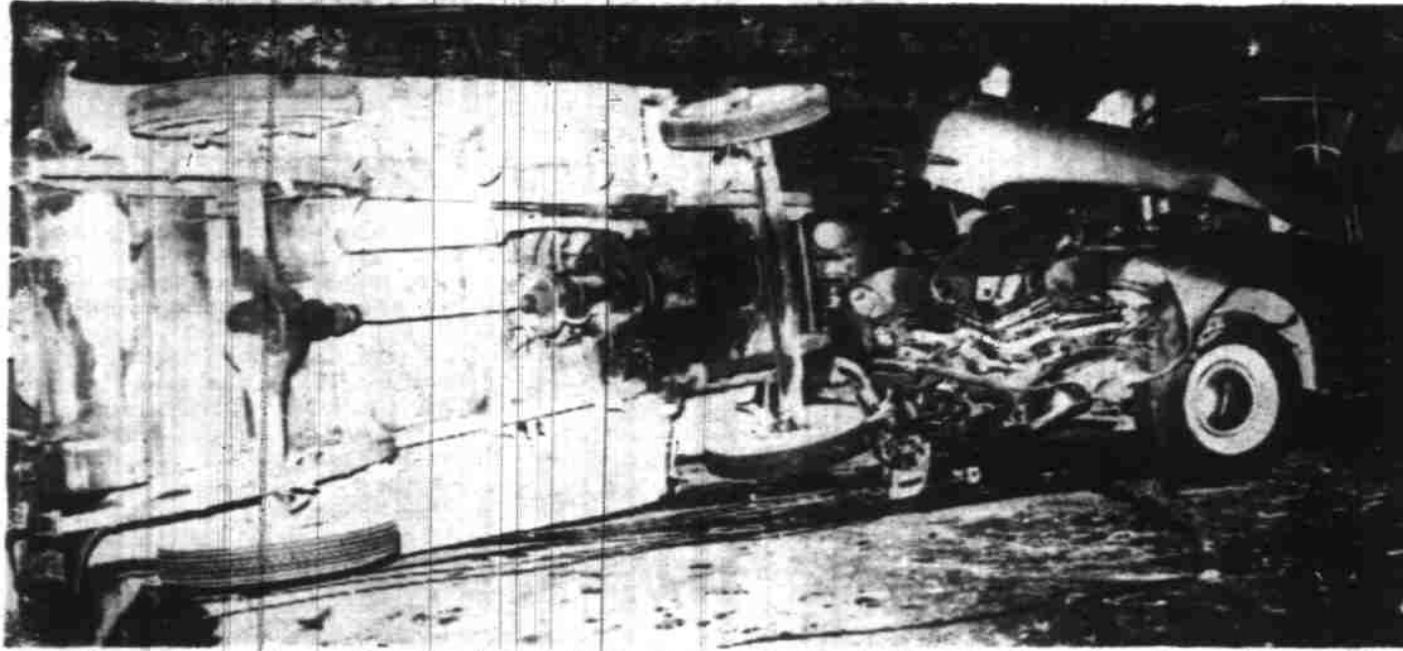
ALBANY—Mrs. Herman Abraham of route 4, Albany, is in the Anderson hospital in Corvallis as the result of an auto accident.

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Polk 4-H Club Achievement Day Is Nov. 5

Polk county's annual 4-H club achievement program will be Friday afternoon, November 5, and will be preceded by the annual chamber of commerce luncheon honoring outstanding 4-H club members who have unusual records in their own particular fields.

One of the highlights of last year's achievement day which will be repeated this year is the parade of 4-H club members who are participating in the day's festivities down Main street from the high school grounds to the Majestic theatre where all will assemble for the afternoon program.

It is particularly important that club members complete their record books and send them to the county extension office in Dallas, R. M. Ohling, county extension agent, says, since only those who have completed their projects will be invited to attend this year's achievement day. Main reason for this restriction, not followed in the past, is attributed to the increased number of 4-H club members and an expected record number of projects to be completed in Polk county this year.

4-H Clubs Available To All Girls of County

DALLAS — Polk county girls interested in 4-H club work should organize their clubs this month, Viola Schaffer, home extension agent, says. Homemaking such as sewing, cooking, room improvement, knitting and food preservation are available. A standard 4-H club must have at least five members and meet 10 times in the year.

Club members are directed by a local leader who is provided with instruction books for both herself and for the club members, by the county extension office.

Girls living in West Salem, Independence, Monmouth or Dallas are eligible to belong to 4-H clubs as well as those in the rural areas. It is important that clubs be organized at this time so members will have adequate time to complete projects by the end of the school year, Mrs. Schaffer points out.

Girls interested and who have organized a club but do not have a leader should write Mrs. Schaffer, county extension agent, Polk county courthouse, Dallas, for the names of women in their community who have volunteered to lead a 4-H club this year.
