Dewey took part in a memorial dinner honoring the late Alfred E. Smith, New York governor who ran for the presidency in 1928 and lost to Republican Herbert Hoover.

Seedlings to Be Distributed To Farmers

Distribution of more than 2,000,000 seedlings to Oregon farmers will begin next week, Vern E. McDaniel, superintendent of the state forestry department tree nursery located near Corvallis, announced Thursday.

McDaniel said the digging would begin Monday and the small trees which are to be used for wind-break and on farmlands would be shipped as orders are received. Orders should be mailed to the state forestry department in Salem, McDaniel said.

Last year more than 800 farmers obtained individual orders and accounted for 1,500,000 trees. Species available at the nursery are Douglas fir, Port Orford cedar, Ponderosa, black locust, Scotch pine, Chinese arbutus, Russian mulberry and green ash. Cost to farmers will be \$5 per thousand in addition to the mailing expense.

McDaniel said he expected a favorable planting season and that he already has made plans to supply state forestry planting crews with half a million Douglas fir seedlings. The seedlings will be planted on cut-over lands in Coos, Lane and Linn counties which are being rehabilitated under the forest conservation law.

State Racing Fund Drops

Racing commission revenues for 1948, available for county fairs and other shows in Oregon, aggregated only \$561,723, as against \$775,570 for 1947, Secretary of State Earl T. Newby announced here Thursday in making the second and final distribution of these funds for the year.

The reduction in this year's revenues was due largely to suspension of operations at the Meadows track in Portland because of the Vanport flood.

Each county received \$4,333 for county fairs, making a total of \$64,222 each for this year.

Other fairs and shows participating, together with the amount of their apportionment, follows:

Eastern Oregon livestock show \$7,500, northwestern turkey show \$2,400, Pendleton roundup \$7,500, Pacific International Livestock Exposition \$35,000, Oregon state fair \$35,000, mid-Columbia livestock show \$5,000, Klamath Basin Roundup association \$5,000, spring lamb and dairy show \$2,500, Pacific coast turkey exhibit \$2,400.

Oregon state corn show, \$2,500.

The state general fund received \$215,723 during the year, Newby said.

Magic Show at School Tonight

A magician's show sponsored by Parrish junior high school will be presented by Lee Grabel in the senior high school auditorium at 8 o'clock tonight.

Grabel has earned a national reputation for his repertoire of magic which includes both sleight of hand and tricks of illusion. He also performs Houdini - invented escapes and impersonates foreign magicians in his show. Grabel has been a professional magician since 1930.

Proceeds from the show will go into a fund for the purchase of a piano for the Parrish junior high auditorium, which will be added to the school in a construction project soon.

Video Reproduces 'Gone with Wind' In 141 Seconds

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Faster than the wind, the entire 1947 pages of "Gone with the Wind" were broadcast by radio-television today.

The new development is called Ultrafax.

President David Sarnoff of the Radio Corporation of America termed it "as significant as a milestone in the field of communications as was the splitting of the atom in the world of energy."

In exactly two minutes and 21 seconds, the new process televised and transmitted Margaret Mitchell's bulky Civil War novel from the sending point to a receiving station set up in the Library of Congress three miles away.

The pages of the novel had first been recorded on microfilm. Then, via television, they were flashed page by page onto negative microfilm at the receiving station.

Anna Ronne Dies Following Year's Illness

Anna M. Ronne, wife of T. E. Ronne, Salem, died Thursday at the age of 76 years after an illness of one year.

She was born in Minneapolis, Minn., Sept. 13, 1872, spent her early life there and married Mr. Ronne. Later they lived in Montana and California, moving to Salem about four years ago. The couple observed their 55th wedding anniversary here recently.

One son, Edwin Ronne, an aviator in World War I was killed in an airplane crash in New York in 1928.

Besides her widower she is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Frances Ayers, Salem, Mrs. L. C. Matchan and Mrs. Elizabeth Reid, both of Minneapolis.

She was a member of the Order of Eastern Star at Santa Cruz, Calif. Ritualistic services will be conducted at the W. T. Rigdon chapel at 3 p. m. Saturday by the Chadwick chapter 37, OES. Concluding services will be held at Mt. Crest Abbey mausoleum.

Such a ruling was adopted at the opening of fall term, the university said in rejecting a request for speeches by democratic leaders.

Weldon Sent To Hospital for Observation

Henry Weldon, 78-year-old Stayton farmer charged with the shotgun slaying of his son, will be transferred today from the Marion county jail to the Oregon state hospital for 30 days of observation and mental tests.

A motion for the transfer was signed late Thursday noon by Circuit Judge George Duncan. The request was made by Allan Carson, Weldon's attorney, and District Attorney Miller Hayden.

Weldon, charged with first-degree murder, has been confined in the county jail since waiving preliminary examination in district court where he was bound over the grand jury.

He is charged with the fatal shooting of his son, Carl Weldon, 40, on September 3, while the younger man was shaving in preparation for attending his mother's funeral that afternoon. Carl died in a Salem hospital September 10.

The elder Weldon, who police said turned the shotgun on himself after wounding his son, recovered from head wounds in the hospital about a month ago and was transferred to the county jail. His case was scheduled to be considered by the grand jury which is currently in session.

Death Takes Mrs. Clark

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 2 o'clock in the Elough-Barick chapel for Mrs. Rosetta Clark, resident of Salem for the past 15 years, who died Thursday at a local hospital at the age of 84.

Mrs. Clark was born in Keokuk, Iowa, Aug. 12, 1864 and moved to Kansas at an early age. She lived in Kansas until moving to Salem in 1933. She was married to Samuel R. Clark, who died in 1921. She was a member of the Methodist church of Harding, Kan.

She had lived in the Sunnyside, Rosedale and Liberty districts south of Salem.

She is survived by three sons, H. L. Clark and Ernest Clark, both of Salem and Ray Clark of Banner, Ark.; sister, Mrs. Anna St. John, Naches, Wash. Two daughters preceded her in death. Also surviving are 18 grandchildren, 42 great grandchildren and 10 great, great grandchildren.

Following services here with the Rev. Oscar Brown officiating, shipment will be made to Mapleton, Kan., for interment.

Dallas Lights Cut as Car Hits Power Pole

An Independence man miraculously escaped possible injury and electrocution early Thursday morning on the Salem-Dallas highway when his car struck and snapped off a high tension power line pole during a heavy fog and rolled over a 20-foot bank.

The accident, which occurred near Holman state park, four miles west of Salem, cut off Dallas' power supply from 12:30 to 6:30 a.m. when repairs were completed. State police said the pole supported wires carrying up to 60,000 volts. Salem lights were dimmed when the lines fell.

The driver was identified by state police as Harvey Threbu, Independence. Officers said he was driving toward Independence when his auto went out of control in pea-soup fog, severed the pole and became solid flame as it rolled over the bank enmeshed in the power lines. Threbu stepped from the demolished vehicle completely unhurt.

Two other vehicles, a car and a light truck, struck a line from the broken pole a few minutes after the accident, but occupants were unhurt. Police said they left the scene without giving their names.

3 Youths Missing at State Training School
