Street, Alley Vacations Asked By Salem District School Board

Vacation of several streets and alleys in the areas of Highland, Salem high and Leslie junior high schools was requested of the council Monday night by the Salem district school board.

Attorney Walter Winslow, representing the school board, said most of the streets were never opened and are now covered by the three schools. Several months ago the council vacated streets in the Parrish junior high school property of the school board.

Remonstrance against one of the proposed vacations, however, was brought by Myrl G. Clark, who told the council development of property he owns east of Leslie school depends on eventual opening of Raynor street to give outlet to southbound traffic. He said an alternate street could be provided if the school board purchases property he has offered for \$1,600.

The council set a public hearing on the proposed vacations for 7:30 p.m. Monday, December 13. Public hearing was held last night on another vacation proposal and the matter was referred to the city planning and zoning commission after Wilbur Tripp asked that part of 25-foot Calmar street be closed by the city in exchange for a 50-foot access street with turnaround in newly developed property between Pearl and Market streets, near 15th street.

The council ordered no-parking spaces 10-feet on either side of driveways of a state warehouse and a wheel alignment business on Ferry street near 13th street. A traffic check was ordered for the Saginaw-Myer streets intersection.

A bill was introduced to change the name of Iowa avenue to Candalaria boulevard and ordinances were adopted to place magazine solicitors under the recently passed solicitors' ordinance, and to assess property owners for paving of McCoy avenue from Madison to Erixon streets.

Street improvement petitions were adopted for Rose street from Breyman to Chemeketa streets and for 15th street from Norway to Jefferson streets, the paving to be done next year. A Linden lane improvement petition was referred to the city manager for check of signatures.

The council passed 29 sidewalk resolutions to provide walks on the south side of Gaine between Liberty and 4th streets and for numerous lots on both sides of South 12th street from Howard street south to city limits.

Fairview Blaze Destroys Hogs
Fire early Monday morning burned a small building at Fairview home southeast of Salem, destroying five sows and 50 suckling pigs before city firemen arrived.

The blaze was discovered at 1:40 a.m. and was being controlled by the institution's fire crew when the city department arrived. Salem firemen kept the flames from spreading to nearby buildings.

Origin of the blaze was not determined.

Episcopalians Hold Annual Meet in Salem

More than 100 Episcopal clergymen, laymen and their wives were in Salem Monday for the annual meeting of the Oregon central deanery, an organization of 11 Willamette valley churches.

The Rev. George H. Swift, pastor of St. Paul's church in Salem and dean of the central deanery, presided at the main banquet session Monday evening at the Marion hotel.

Speakers were the Rt. Rev. Benjamin Dagwell, bishop of the diocese; C. Watzek, Portland layman; Arch Deacon Perry Smith, Albany, and Frances Pickard, head of the diocesan department of Christian education.

The subject discussed was development of Christian education, missionary work and parish support in the Oregon Episcopal diocese.

The annual session opened in the afternoon at St. Paul's with a business meeting of clergymen and laymen and a women's tea and meeting.

Bishop Dagwell delivered the principal address to the men's group. Miss Pickard and Helen Schnurbush, head of the Episcopal women's program at Oregon State college, were featured speakers for the women's meeting. Mrs. Marjorie Harris, president of St. Paul's Women's auxiliary, presided at the meeting and Mrs. Swift was in charge of the tea.

Wilson A. Maisel, 30, one of two men killed Saturday when their light plane crashed into a bluff near Scappoose, was the son of

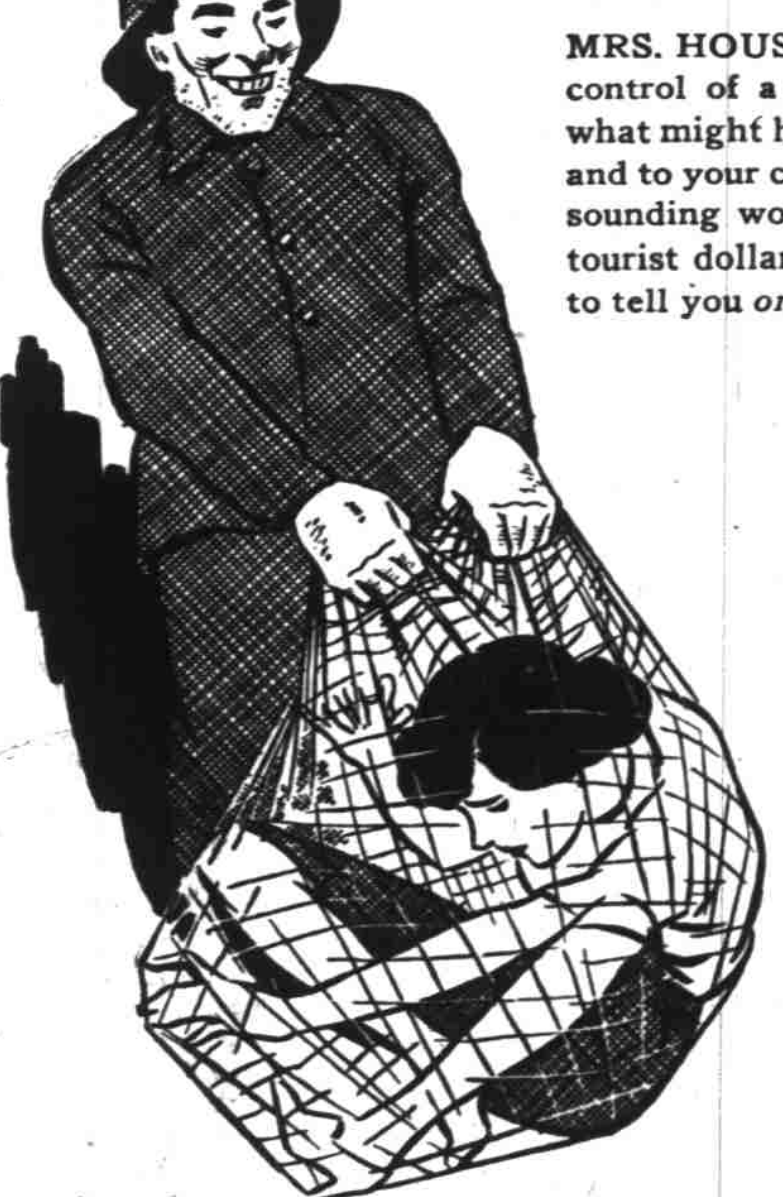

THE GILLNETTERS WOULD SNARE YOU WITH THEIR NET OF MONOPOLY!!



MRS. HOUSEWIFE... when one small group gains control of a food product's source can you imagine what might happen to the price of that food product—and to your cost of living? Throwing out a net of high-sounding words about "resources, sports fishing and tourist dollars" the Gillnetters' Union have forgotten to tell you one thing.

The initiative bill for the elimination of fixed gear in the Columbia River gives to the gillnetters 90% of all the catch on the Columbia River—the remaining 10% being caught by the Indians at Celilo.

The Oregon Fish Commission in its June, 1948 report, the Oregon Voter, and Oregon State Planning Board, all say the same thing. Elimination of fixed gear on the Columbia River does not act as a salmon conservation project—but in reality only means that other gear catch more and the gillnets will be all that are left.

What could happen to your food budget under a virtual monopoly? What might happen to salmon prices? You have had experience with other monopolies—what is your answer?

And bear this fact in mind—if the gillnetters did not want to gain absolute control—why would they initiate this monopoly bill? Both the state legislature and the Oregon Fish Commission have the authority to regulate all gear for salmon fishing, if it were necessary.

The bill to "eliminate fixed appliances" is not necessary—it only puts monopolistic control in the hands of a minority group—the gillnetters.
