## Exchangites Hear Debate On City Issues

Speakers outlined both sides of two city initiative measures and responded to a barrage of questioning Wednesday noon at the Salem Exchange club meeting in the Salem hotel.

Elmer Arundson backed the proposed commission form of city government, while Rich Reimann spoke for the present manager form. The proposed franchise for Salem Electric was discussed by Jack Frisbie, pro, and Thomas H. Gabriel, con. Moderator was Peery Buren, Salem attorney.

Arundson asserted a commission would bring efficiency to municipal operations by setting up three commissioner-headed departments and by requiring election, rather than council appointment, of the city attorney.

Reimann expressed the thought that "You can never get three men to agree" and doubted the availability of local "experts" for the commission.

Lowered rates by Salem Electric cooperative, as against Portland General Electric company's doing "everything they can to protect their investment and their business in Salem," was the claim of Frisbie on the second issue.

The franchise measure was called too "vague and indefinite" by Gabriel, who said PGE is "organized to serve the public and is controlled by the government," while the co-op is "organized for the profit of the members" and is not subject to governmental regulation nor to taxes.

## Trial Set for Vincent Hallett

An auto theft charge against Vincent Hallett, 24, of 965 N. 5th st., is set for November 3 in Marion county district court.

Hallett, held in lieu of \$2,500 bail in Marion county jail, appeared in district court Wednesday on charges of larceny of an auto belonging to Harold D. Robertson, Salem route 9.

Police charge Hallett with taking Robertson's car from its garage Tuesday night. Earlier that evening a stolen Oregon Journal car was found overturned on the 12th street cutoff a mile south of Salem. Mrs. Zelda McCorkle, a visitor at a nearby home, identified Hallett as the man who came to her door a moment after the crash with a cut hand.

## Wife of Former Salem Man Dies

Word of the death of Mrs. Guy C. Miller, Palo Alto, well known here and wife of a former Salem resident, was received Wednesday by friends. Mrs. Miller was stricken with coronary thrombosis and died last Friday.

Mr. Miller was raised in Salem and attended school here, but has been city historian at Palo Alto for many years.

Other survivors are a son, Max of San Francisco, and a grandson, David Miller.
