Miss Bratzel, who served as secretary to Judge James T. Brand on the war crimes tribunal at Nuerberg, related some of her experiences while secretary. She highlighted incidents from Paris, Holland, Austria, Vienna, Rome, Florence, Naples, Capri, Switzerland, France, Denmark, Norway and Sweden. Last Chance

Tomatoes Green or Ripe, Threatened By Frost, Harvest, Use Quickly

It may not be too late, but it will be mighty soon, to utilize the green tomatoes from the vine. If another heavy frost gets there before the housewife, tomatoes are almost sure to be gone.

Here are several recipes for green tomatoes and also for quinces, another product ready for use now.

GREEN TOMATO PRESERVES

2 pounds green tomatoes sliced
4 cups sugar
1 1/2 cups water
1 lemon
1 stick cinnamon
2 pieces of ginger root

Use small tomatoes and slice them thin. Combine sugar and water, sliced lemon and spices. Cook until clear, about 20 minutes. Remove ginger and cinnamon and add tomatoes and boil until clear. Remove tomatoes to jars, boil syrup until thick as honey. Pour over tomatoes.

TOMATO PRESERVES

1 pound green tomatoes
2 lemons
2 cups sugar

Slice tomatoes, let all stand together overnight, then cook until clear.

QUINCE AND APPLE MARMALADE

Wash quinces and remove blossom ends. Cut fruit into small pieces. Add just enough water to cover, cook until soft then run through a coarse sieve. Add an equal meas-

ure of tart apple pulp 2/3 as much sugar. Cook until thick and clean, about 25 minutes. Pack into clean jars and seal.

QUINCE PRESERVES

2 pounds quinces
3 1/2 cups sugar
2 quarts water

Pare and core quinces half or quarter the fruit. Add 1/2 of the sugar to the water. Boil 5 minutes. Add quince and boil another hour very slowly. Let stand 24 hours. Add remaining sugar and cook slowly until fruit is clear rich and red in color. Let stand overnight, then fruit pack in jars boil the syrup down until it almost jells, add to the fruit and seal.
