CHICAGO, Oct. 30-(AP)-Contin-ued heavy marketing of corn from the country softened the futures price around a cent a bushel today. Mixed influences on other board of trade commodities, how-

ever, gave them an irregular zone. Wheat receded early and stayed there most of the day, although some recovery was made near the close. Reports of some rain in the wheat belt caused losses of as much as a cent at times.

At the close wheat was 1/2 cent lower to 1/4 higher, corn 1/4 to one cent down, oats unchanged to % lower, rye 1/2 to 11/2 higher, soybeans one to two cents up, and lards five to 27 cents a hundred
