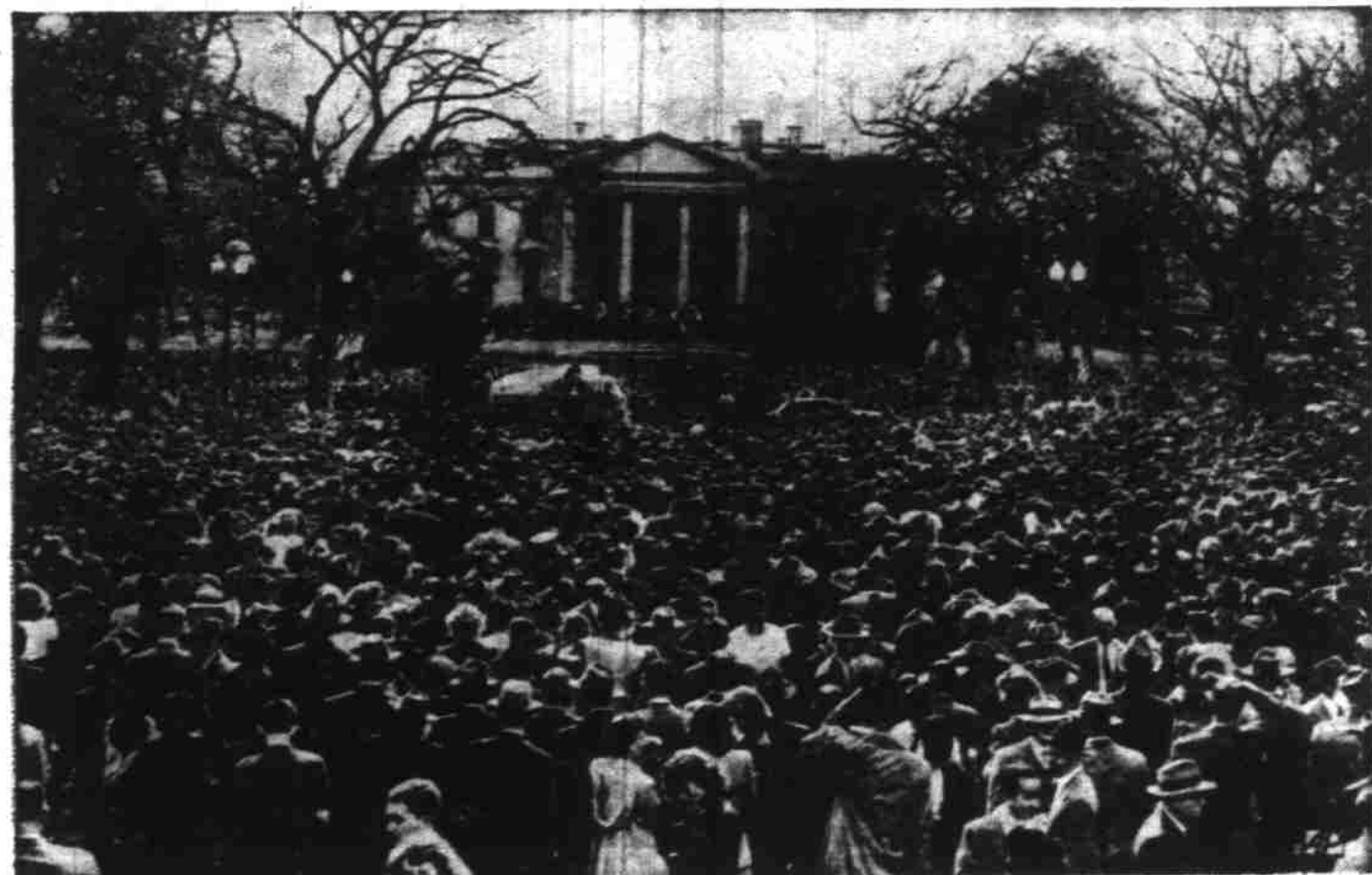


Crowd Jams Park to Greet President

Car Thieves Shoot-It-Out with Policeman, West Salem Man

The story of a bird hunt that turned into a man hunt was related here Friday night by Walter E. White, owner of the Kingwood Grocery in West Salem.

White, with State Patrolman Robert Steele, Salem, captured one of a pair of car theft suspects after an exchange of shots in the desert country 50 miles west of Bend Thursday afternoon.

White and Steele were returning from a bird hunting expedition into eastern Oregon when they spotted two hitchhikers. Just beyond they noticed an abandoned car with missing license plates. Steele returned to question the pair and placed them under arrest. The suspects pulled guns, and Steele grappled for one of them. The gun went off and the bullet tore through Steele's shirt, burning his arm.

The armed pair tried to escape in White's automobile but were unable to get it started. They shot again at Steele through the windshield of the car and then ran into the desert. White and Steele chased them and Benson Kuns, 24, St. Louis, was captured after a mile and a half pursuit. He had been peppered severely several times by Steele's shot-gun blasts. The second man escaped into the desert. A manhunt Friday throughout the area failed to find the man identified by Kuns as being Roy Kincaid, also of St. Louis.

Russia Told U.S. 'Intends To Be Strong'

PARIS, Nov. 5—(AP)—John Foster Dulles told the Russian Bloc today that the United States has stopped disarming and "intends to be strong" so long as fears grip the free peoples of the world.

From the tone and manner of his speech it was apparent that a firm American policy in the United Nations assembly is shaping up quickly after last Tuesday's presidential election.

Dulles, the republican party adviser on foreign affairs, thus indicated the election had not changed in any way the general foreign policy supported by both republicans and democrats.

He denounced as "vicious falsehoods" Russian charges that the United States aim for world mastery. Dulles told the U.N. political committee:

"Our growing national strength no doubt displeases some; but it does not, I believe, frighten any. I ask each delegate to search his own mind and come to his own conclusion as to who and what his nation fears. I shall be satisfied with a silent verdict, for I know that some fear even to express their fear."

Tornadoes in South Fatal to 8, Injure 67

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 5—(AP)—Eight persons were killed and 67 others injured when small tornadoes and heavy windstorms ripped through sections of Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, Kentucky and Georgia early today and tonight.

A tornado smashed through Cedar town in northwest Georgia, tonight, injuring five persons, wrecking several buildings, and leaving the town in darkness and confusion. Police Lt. A. J. Barrett said those injured were cut by plate glass blasted from downtown show windows.

ning at Ripley, Miss., close to the Tennessee line; near Benton, Miss., in the central area not far from Jackson; and in rural Catahoula Parish (county), La., about 38 miles northwest of Natchez, Miss. A tornado also lashed a community eight miles south of Vicksburg, Miss.

Violent winds also swept the central section of Kentucky causing injuries and damage. And another hard wind struck near Alexandria, La.

And in darkness last night a small-scale twister concentrated on the municipal airport at Searcy, Ark., wrecking two hangars and demolishing nine planes. No one was hurt.

The Benton, Miss., area suffered most in casualties. Five unidentified negroes and a white child were killed and eight persons were injured. Sheriff Sam Parker at nearby Yazoo city said the child's name was White. Ten houses were reported destroyed in a 15-mile stretch.

At Corinth, Miss., one person died and 13 others received hospital treatment. Six houses were reported demolished.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5—(AP) Vice President-elect Alben W. Barkley said today he believes the new congress will approve some legislation aimed at controlling prices.

"I think congress will deal with the subject and give the president something like the authority he asked for before," Barkley told a news conference.

Name Added to Aspirants to McKay's Post

The race to win the post of state senator now held by governor-elect Douglas McKay, began to shape up as a hot one Friday although no official action has been taken by Marion county court, the body which is to appoint McKay's successor.

Newest name to be added to the list of aspirants is that of Winton Hunt, Woodburn insurance man. His name has already been listed with the county court. Although the name of John Ramage, Woodburn, also has been mentioned, Ramage said Friday he was not interested and the county court offered no comment.

Marion County Commissioner Roy Rice said the court is awaiting official notice from the secretary of state's office that a senatorial vacancy exists in this county. McKay said earlier this week he would not resign until he has sat with the highway interim group appointed by the 1947 session. The committee has scheduled hearings for the next two months.

Among several other names suggested to the county court are those of former State Sen. Ronald Jones of Brooks, Romeo Goulet, State Rep. W. W. Chadwick, H. R. (Farmer) Jones, former house member; Fred S. Lamport, former pro tem senator in the 1943-45 session when McKay was in the army, and Carl Hogg, delegate to the republican national convention.

The silver star medal for gallantry on Iwo Jima was awarded Sgt. George E. Bartlett at ceremonies at Marine corps offices in Portland Friday.

Bartlett, on temporary duty with the recruiting office in Salem, was credited with contributing heavily to the success of a March 8, 1945 rocket attack on the Japanese by volunteering to accompany the launcher 150 yards in advance of the front lines to direct fire.
