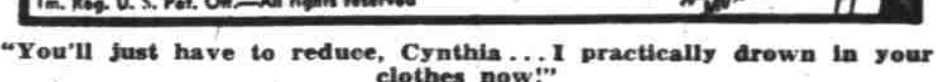

money. The very fact there was such a large volume of Truman money indicated a lot of people believed the polls were haywire.

Carroll said he made a profit on the presidential race itself but that this was offset by the beating he took on some "freak bets." He indicated his personal losses may run into the hundreds of thousands.

Carroll quoted odds of 8 to 1 on Truman. In other words, he paid Truman bettors eight dollars for every dollar they put up. Local bookmakers said odds as high as 18 to 1 against Truman were offered in New York on election eve.

U.S. to Start Potato Buying

PORTLAND, Nov. 5.—(AP)—The department of agriculture said today it would begin support-price buying of No. 1 potatoes in central Oregon and the Klamath basin.

Officials said market prices had begun to sag. To bolster them, the department expects to buy about 30 carloads of potatoes daily for the rest of November.

Growers will receive the FOB support price of \$2.95 a hundred pounds for No. 1 potatoes. No. 2's bring half that price.
