STOCKS DROP TO LOWEST LEVEL SINCE MARCH New York, Nov. 9 (AP)—The stock market dropped to the lowest level since late March today under a post-election pounding. Leading issues plunged 1 to 2 points, some to new lows for the year. Extreme losses piled up to 100 points at one time.

Pressure was so intense at times that twice during the day the price reporting mechanism failed to keep up with dealings on the floor of the exchange. Just before the close enough buying power appeared to shave the day's widest losses but there was nothing like a full-scale rally.

Volume expanded to 2,240,000 shares from yesterday's 1,130,000. This was below two big sessions last week, when prices cracked in the first reaction to the election results, but still an unusually large amount of business.

Selling was general. Big-time traders as well as the little fellow along the line sold out or lightened stock holdings.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks closed 2 points lower at 63.9. Not since March 29 has so low a level been reached. Bottom for the year was touched Feb. 10 at 61.5.

Of the 1,013 stocks which changed hands, 970 declined while only 85 advanced. More than 175 issues sold at new lows for the year.

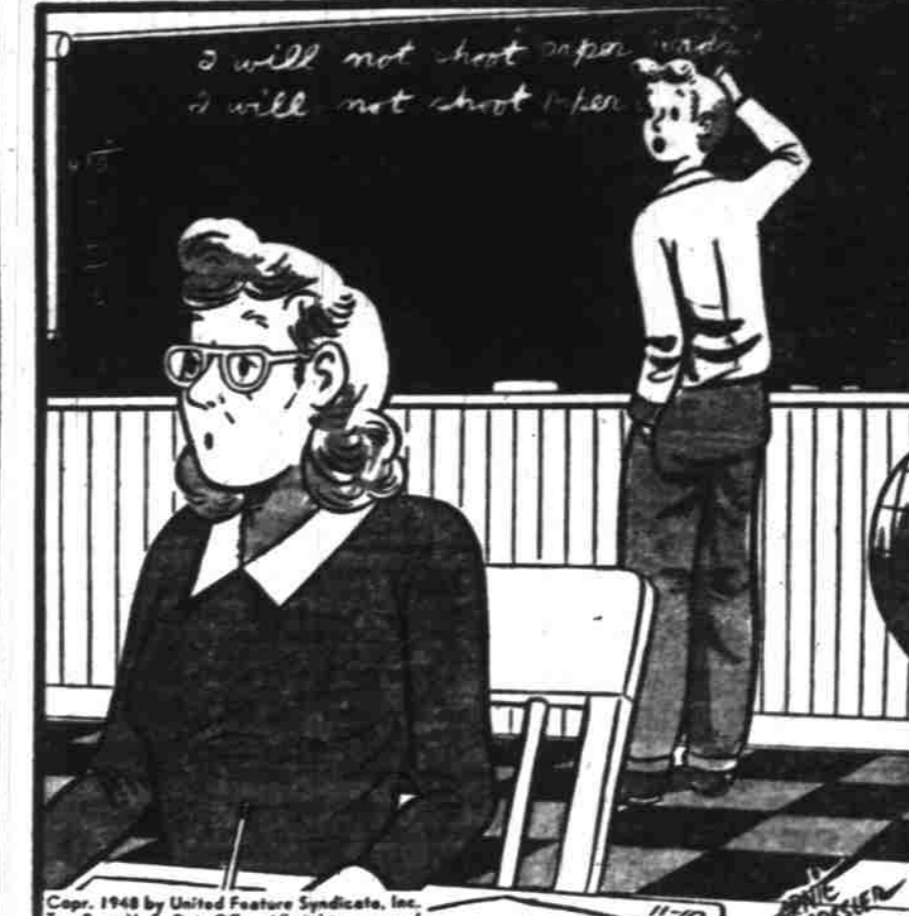
