## County Plans New Bridge on Abiqua Creek

A new bridge over the Abiqua creek on county road 657 north-east of Silvertown to replace the present old wooden Dunigan crossing span was virtually assured by the Marion county court Friday.

The court ordered the county engineer to draw up an estimate of expenses for the new structure. Commissioner Roy Rice indicated the new bridge would go in this winter. He estimated it would be a 75-foot span.

Decision on a new bridge resulted when the court was informed by County Engineer Hedra Swart that the present structure could not be repaired sufficiently to meet safety standards. The state highway department has placed a two-ton load limit on the bridge.

A school bus hauling children to the Evans Valley school over the bridge has to stop and allow the children to walk over the span as the loaded bus weighs over seven tons, a citizens' delegation told the court earlier this week.

## County 3rd in Number of Car Registrations

Marion county retained third place in the number of motor vehicles as Oregon registrations totaled 582,522 at the end of September, a gain of 12 per cent over last year, a report by Secretary of State Earl T. Newbery showed Friday.

Marion county's 37,001 vehicles (4,117 over last year) compared with Lane county's 44,335 and Multnomah's 174,962. Marion's percentage gain was average at 12 per cent, but not among the first 10 counties for percentage increase.

The report revealed no change in the makeup of the 10 leading counties, although Linn moved up a notch to displace Klamath in seventh spot. The registration leaders in order are Multnomah, Lane, Marion, Clackamas, Jackson, Washington, Linn, Klamath, Douglas and Umatilla.

Top 10 counties by percentage gains, in order, are Jefferson, Douglas, Wheeler, Harney, Linn, Grant, Lane, Coos, Malheur and Benton.

Multnomah county with one-third the total state registration showed an 8.6 per cent increase.

## Women's Purses Stolen Through Bedroom Window

Three women's purses and a man's billfold, containing a total of \$247, were stolen from a bedroom of the H. L. Moorman residence, 2025 Warner st., Thursday night while a party was in progress elsewhere in the house.

Both evinced confidence that Salem well warrants their organization's expansion to this area. The Leed store, occupying space formerly used by the Fred Meyer bakery, is being completely remodeled under contract with Viesko & Post. It will be larger than the organization's outlet in Eugene, Landau said, and one of the most modern shoe stores on the coast. Portland and Eugene are the only other Oregon towns with Leed stores, of which there are more than 200.

Landau said all employees, with the exception of the manager, would be from the Salem area.
