It started when the commission voted, 4-3, to recommend the reinstatement of three fired policemen. The policemen had been discharged while K. C. Gulick—now since ousted himself—was police chief.

Truman Ready For Atlantic Treaty Talks

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—The Truman administration, with powerful republican backing, made ready today to begin crucial new talks looking toward an Atlantic alliance against expansion of Soviet power.

Britain, France, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg have been laboring in London seeking agreement on a draft of an agreement for submission to Secretary of State Marshall here. Marshall told his news conference yesterday that he assumes the United States will begin discussions shortly with these countries and Canada.

When the U. S. negotiators agree with the other countries on terms of the proposed alliance, it is expected that a number of other countries will be invited to join in a full-fledged international conference to consider the question.

Whether the United States ratifies the proposed pact, and just what military aid this country will give to the other nations are questions for congress to determine finally.

But the alliance idea drew strong support today from Rep. Eaton (R-N. J.), top republican foreign policy adviser. Eaton has been chairman of the house foreign affairs committee in the 80th congress and will be ranking minority member of the committee in the new congress.

The United States, he told reporters, should stand ready to supply arms and technical advice to friendly western European nations "if they need it and if we have it to spare."

It would be "the last calamity of our age," he said, if western Europe should fall under the domination of Russia. Strong support for military, as well as economic aid, for western Europe came, too, from a committee of the chamber of commerce of the United States.

What the Kremlin seems to respect is force and only force," the committee added. Submitted for possible action by the chamber as a whole later, the report was prepared under the chairmanship of Clem D. Johnston of Roanoke, Va.

Moscow's leadership must be convinced, the report said, of two things: 1. That the U. S. will avoid both aggression and the path which leads to appeasement. 2. That it will develop not only its own means of defense, but will assist the ECA (economic cooperation administration) nations to help themselves economically and militarily.
