Symphony Concert Ticket Holders to Exchange Ducats

Salem people holding admission tickets for the Portland Symphony orchestra concerts here December 7, January 25 and March 1, are to exchange them for reserved seats this week, according to George Kaye, president of the sponsoring group here. A ticket exchange office is to be set up Monday at 10 a. m. in the Ladd and Bush bank, and will be open during banking hours all week.

The travel schedule for the orchestra includes appearance in Albany, Corvallis, Newberg, Salem and Longview. Vernon R. Churchill, president of the Portland Symphony society, said the orchestra is visiting as many communities as is financially feasible. The orchestra may be considered an all-Oregon affair, not merely a Portland project.

Among the leaders behind the better music program in those cities are Kaye, Mrs. C. C. Hallin, Longview; Ralph S. Senders of Albany; president of the Linn County Community Concert association, and Robert Mix, Corvallis.
