Fire Department Has Election at Stayton

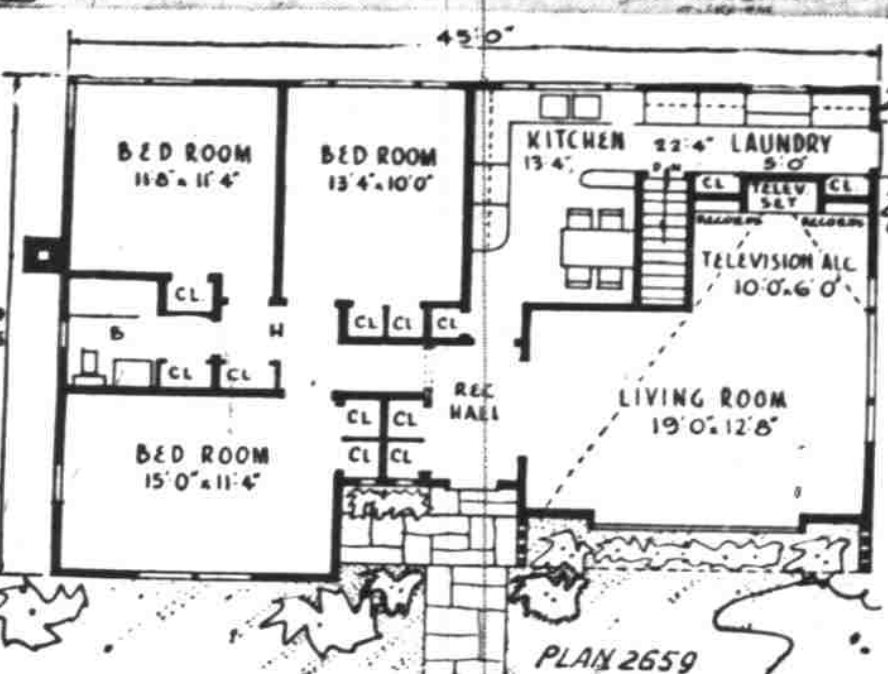
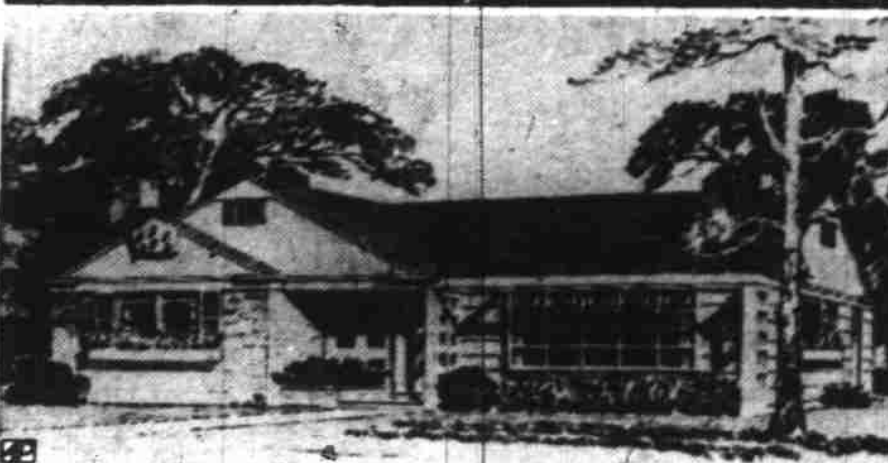

Restaurants first became really popular after the French revolution when aristocrats could no longer afford great retinues of servants.

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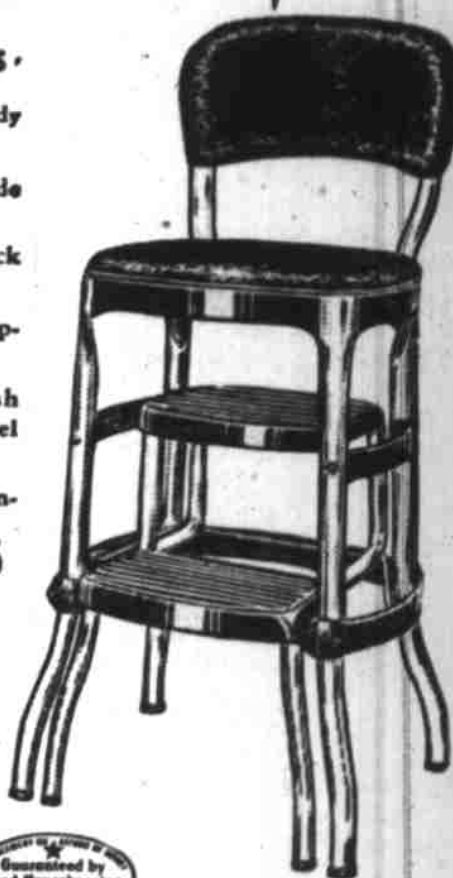
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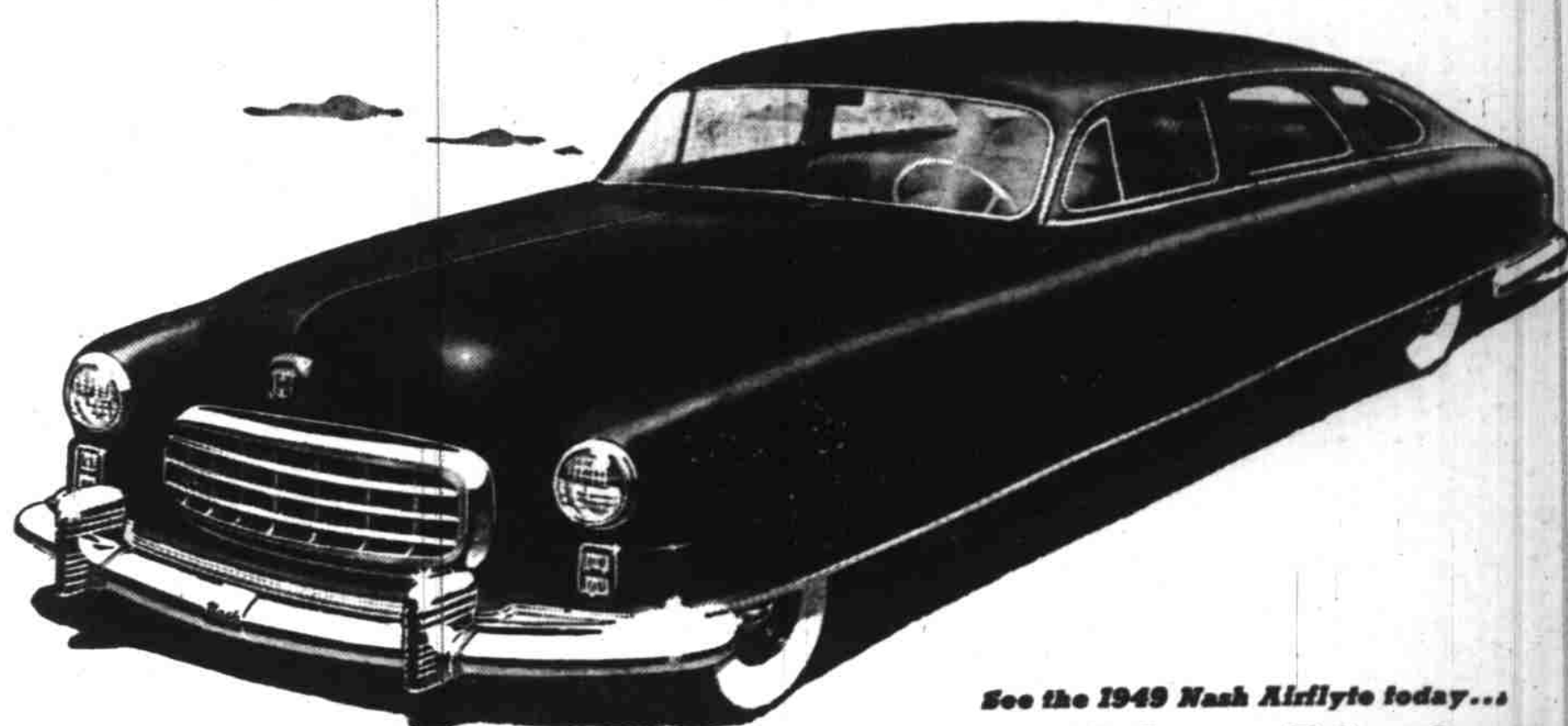
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
