Hickman Poultry Wins Many Honors At Yakima Show

KEIZER, Dec. 11—M. G. (Mickey) Hickman placed 32 of his 36 registered birds at the Washington State Winter Poultry show at Yakima which was held last week. For the third successive year he won a championship ribbon on his exhibit of bantams, this year it was for his Rose Comb White Leghorn bantam hen, in 1946 and 1947 he took championship for his Black Rose Comb bantam cockerel.

On his standard bred White Leghorns he took 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th for cockerels. Besides the championship in Rose Comb White Leghorn, bantam, he took first for cockerel, 1st and 2nd for pullet and 1st for young hen.

He won 1st and 2nd on the two Black Rose Comb bantam cockerels, first on a hen, and 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th on his five cockerel entries, and 3rd and 5th on two pullets, 1st and 2nd on an old trio, and first on young trios.

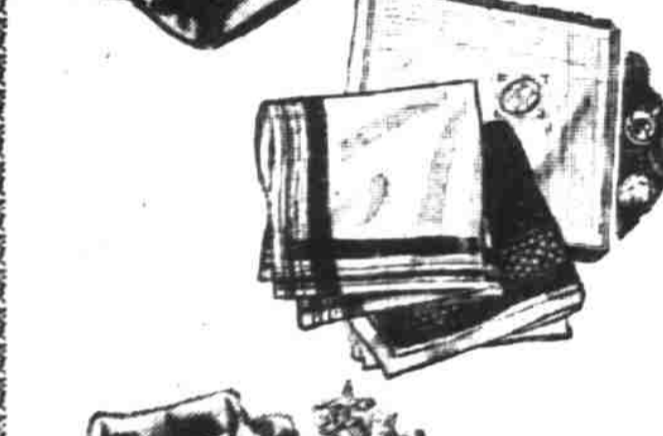
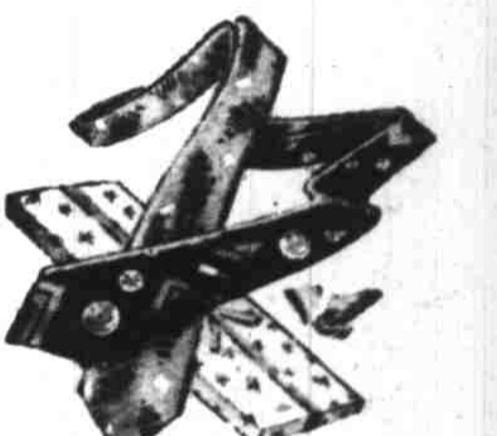
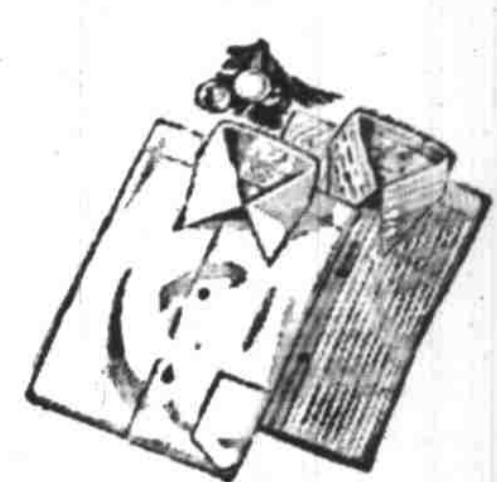
