Edwards, Isom Butcher Plant Changes Hands

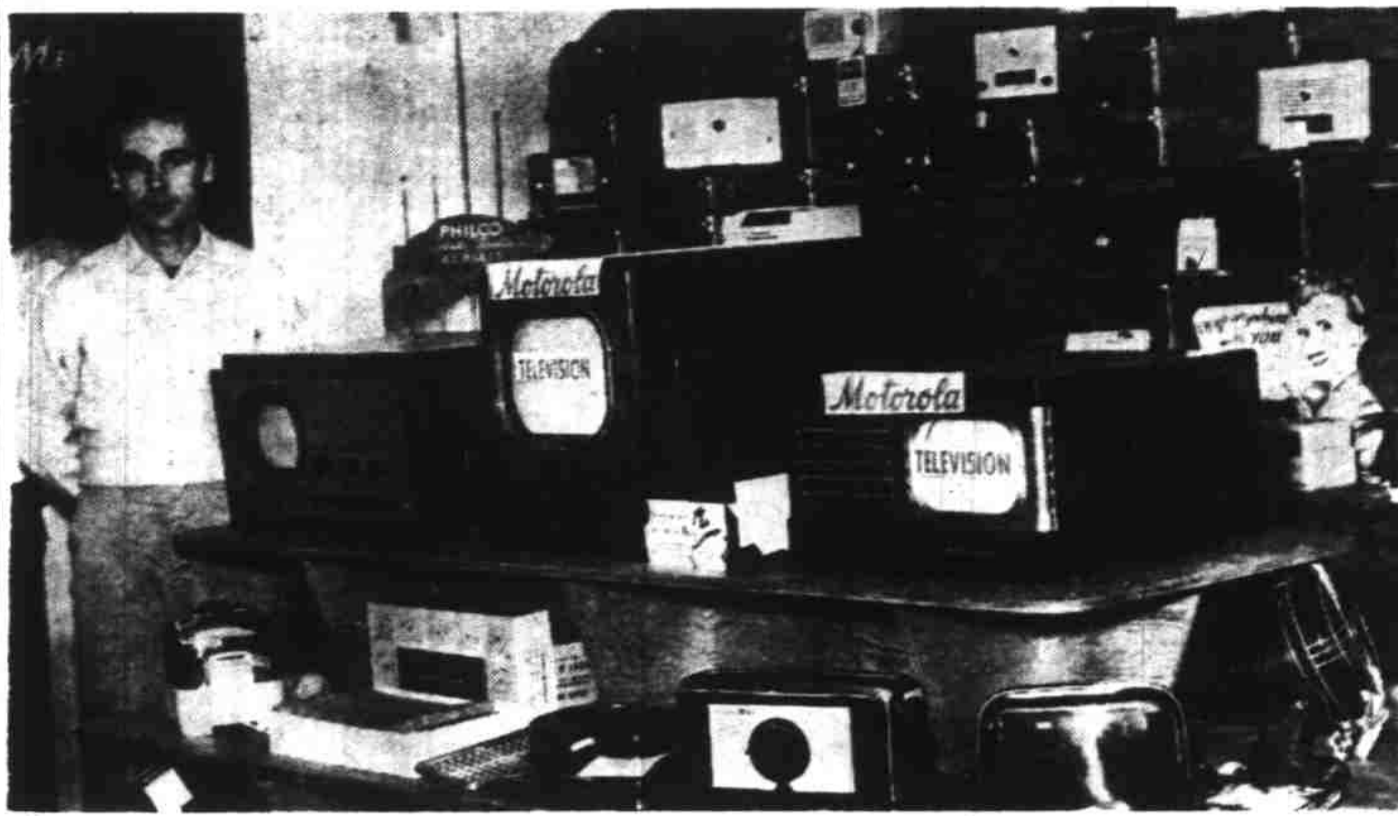
Ownership and operation of the Edwards and Isom custom butchering plant, 25th and Mission streets, was assumed Monday morning by Milton Van Zanten, operating of the meat markets in two Saving Center stores in Salem. The firm will now be known as MonArk Meat company.

Van Zanten announced plans to broaden the plant's activities into packing for the wholesale market. It will also add sausage making and will continue custom butchering.

The firm was started in 1930 by Berton E. Edwards, now in the cold storage locker business at Keizer, and Norval E. Edwards, his son. The plant burned in 1934 and was rebuilt in 1935. The younger Edwards has operated it since then. He said he would open some new business here.

Clarence L. Isom, associated with Edwards for the past three years, plans to remain temporarily with Van Zanten.

Judge Sustains Demurrer in Telephone Suit

Marion County Circuit Judge E. M. Page ruled Monday that his court has no jurisdiction over the matter of a suit between The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company and Public Utilities Commissioner George H. Flagg.

The judge sustained Flagg's demurrer on the grounds that his court has no jurisdiction and that the complaint does not state sufficient facts for a cause of action.

Judge Page heard arguments on the demurrer December 6. The suit seeks authorization of the court to include in the Pacific company's budget a payment to the American Telephone and Telegraph company for services rendered.

Flagg recently rejected the item on the grounds the payments should be based on actual services rather than on a contract basis. The utilities commission in its demurrer contended that the company should first exhaust its procedure before the PUC before going to the courts.
