All Equipment, Supplies Ready For Legislators

All equipment and supplies for the 1949 legislative session are on hand at the capitol, and material for legislators themselves are ready to be placed in their desks the week before the session starts, according to Secretary of State Earl T. Newbery.

New typewriters for the legislature were purchased last summer, and this time they will probably be retained for future sessions, said Newbery. After the first postwar session, in 1947, the new machines bought for the legislature were later sold to state departments who had been unable to get new ones during the war.

Offices Vacated

Offices of a half dozen departments and divisions already have vacated quarters in the capitol building to allow legislative committee use of their rooms. Largest group to move out is the state auditing office, which was in the ways and means committee chamber and is now in a state-owned house on North Capitol street.

Following the session, the auditing office will move back, but this may be the last time such transfers are necessary. By the 1951 meeting, the new state office building will have been completed, providing considerable more office space than now is available.

Plans to set up a temporary radio broadcasting room on the capitol's second floor, adjacent to the senate and house chambers, were also announced by Newbery. This feature will be made a permanent part of the building after the new office building is completed and demand for office space is eased.
