Stock Prices Fail to Hold Early Gains

By Rader Winger NEW YORK, Dec. 27—(AP)—Early gains failed to stand up in the stock market today and prices slipped a few notches in quiet trading.

There was an appreciable amount of selling pressure in evidence, and most of the changes during the day were made an eighth at a time.

Losses among the leaders were confined to less than a point for the most part. Superior Oil of California was an outstanding exception, losing 7 points at 168.

Gains were largely in minor fractions, although Du Pont was up 3 at 185 and Allied Chemical gained 1/4 at 179 1/2.

For the entire market, declines outnumbered advances by more than 2 to 1. Of the 1,056 individual issues appearing on the quotations tape, 252 were up and 541, were down.

The Associated Press average of 80 stocks declined 2 of a point to 64.8. The industrial component was unchanged, rails were off 2 of a point and utilities were down 3 of a point.

Grains Hold Steady Pace; Close Lower

By William Ferris CHICAGO, Dec. 27—(AP)—Grains today drifted through an uneventful session to close with minor price changes.

Mostly confined to less than a cent. At the end, the biggest price change on the board as compared with Friday's close was 1/2 cent.

Trading was supposed to have started in December wheat, corn and oats but the only one which actually got underway was corn.

Wheat closed 3/4 lower to 1/4 higher, corn was 1/2 - 3/4 lower, oats were unchanged to 1/4 lower, rye was 1/2 higher, soybeans were unchanged to 1/2 higher and lard was up 7 to 13 cents a hundred pounds higher.

There was a small increase in wheat receipts at major terminals, primary arrivals totaling 1,944,000 (M) bushels against 1,717,000 (M) a week earlier.
