Purchases by State Double Pre-War Rate

Purchases by the state board of control now amount to about \$1,000,000 a month or about double the amount of pre-war days, a report filed with Gov. John H. Hall stated Wednesday.

Foy Mills, board secretary, predicted that purchases would continue at their present level or higher during 1949. "There has been no appreciable decrease in the cost of commodities, particularly those purchased for the state institutions during the past few months," Mills averred.

The report showed a total of 7,380 state charges on June 30, 1948, a substantial increase when compared with two years ago. Largest population of 2,743 was reported at the Oregon state hospital with the eastern Oregon state hospital second with 1,359 patients. There were 1,255 inmates of the Oregon state penitentiary and 184 patients at the Oregon state tuberculosis hospital here.

Other state charges included 133 patients at the eastern Oregon state tuberculosis hospital, 132 students at the state school for the blind, 140 at the state school for the deaf, 99 at the state training school for boys and in excess of 100 at the Hillcrest school for girls.

The value of state properties as of June 30, last year, was fixed at \$58,476,210, including buildings valued at \$37,407,769, nonexpendable \$14,436,990 and expendable property \$6,631,451.

Funeral Set Saturday for U. J. Hart, 83

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 10:30 a. m. in the W. T. Rigdon chapel for U. J. Hart, 83, resident of Salem since 1901, who died Wednesday. Interment will be in City View cemetery.

Hart was born in Harristown, Ill., Aug. 21, 1865. He was married to Mary A. Beecher at Ottawa, Kan., Oct. 25, 1894. The couple came to the Salem area in 1901.

For 30 years, Hart was foreman for the Willamette Valley Prune association and retired from that position 10 years ago. Since retiring he had lived at 405 W. Madison ave.

He was a life long member of the Baptist church and a charter member of the Emmanuel Baptist church of Salem.

Survivors are two daughters, Mrs. Adda J. Steuer and Eunice R. Hart, both of Salem, grandson, Cpl. Frank W. Steuer, Ft. Lewis, Wash., and two nieces, Naomi L. Hart and Ruth Brautlatch, both of Portland.

The Rev. T. Clio Brown will officiate at the services.

Grange to Ask State Market Agreements

PORTLAND, Jan. 5-(AP)—The Oregon state grange said today it would ask the state legislature to pass a bill authorizing state marketing agreements.

Such agreements would cover farm commodities sold within the state, in the same way that present federal laws authorize interstate marketing agreements.

The grange proposal would permit agreements if approved by two-thirds of the growers and one-half of the handlers of the particular commodity.

Coroner's Jury Rules Shooting Self Defense

PORTLAND, Jan. 5-(AP)—A coroner's jury ruled today that Othor Williams, 30-year-old man shot during New Year's eve revelry, was killed in self-defense.

The jury cleared Leo Williams of all blame in the shooting. Leo Williams fired in the cafe where he was employed as a bouncer after he had been attacked with a knife.

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Tuberculosis Rate High in Institutions

Concern over tuberculosis cases found in Oregon mental institutions was expressed by Dr. Charles E. Bates, superintendent of Oregon state hospital, in a year-end report of state institutions filed with Gov. John H. Hall Wednesday.

"Because of overcrowded conditions the tuberculosis problem in the Oregon state hospital has resulted in a serious medical problem," Dr. Bates declared. He said the Oregon state hospital now has 56 active tuberculosis cases and 17 suspects not in tubercular wards.

Liberalization of Oregon's commitment laws with elimination of technicalities was urged by Dr. Donald Wain, head of the eastern Oregon state hospital at Pendleton. He said the emergency commitment law repealed by the 1947 legislature should be restored with certain objectionable features eliminated.

Middle age men patients continue to present the most serious problem at the western Oregon state tuberculosis hospital in Salem, according to Dr. Grover C. Bellinger, superintendent. He said the death rate in older children, from 5 to 15 years, continues relatively low.

Relief Clothing Drive to Start

A citywide clothing drive for relief abroad will start today and continue one month, it was decided Wednesday night by the Phalanx club at the YMCA.

Children's or adult clothing brought to the YMCA will be prepared for shipment by the club direct to needy individuals abroad.

The club also decided to help raise transportation funds in connection with a YMCA program to sponsor the location of displaced persons from Europe here.

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Exchange Club Hears Kimmell

How proposed legislation for the hopper of Oregon's legislative sessions is drafted was discussed for Salem Exchange club Wednesday noon by Rex Kimmell, assistant attorney general. He was the first speaker of a series the club has slated on legislative matters.

Kimmell, who has been legal advisor to the legislature for five sessions, stressed the importance of titles to bills and their characteristics. His talk included several examples from past legislation and noted some proposals that may be introduced at the 1949 session.

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
