

Symington Asks for Speed in Building 70-Group Air Force

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—We have "none too much time" to prepare, Secretary of Air Symington said today. And he restated his belief in a 70-group air force despite its heavy cost.

The 70 combat groups are one feature of a four-year program aimed at creating by 1952 an air force able to meet any crisis. The air force began building toward it last year but it takes annual appropriations to fulfill the program.

With a tight national defense budget in prospect, the secretary of the air force said in his first annual report:

Expenditures Great

The expenditures of money which this program requires are great.

"Legislative and executive authorities must constantly weigh the state of world conditions, the military needs of the country, and the efficiency and economy with which the air force is carrying out the program.

"But I solemnly urge that there be most carefully weighed the importance of stability and resoluteness.

"This country has none too much time to provide itself with the means of its own protection.

"It cannot afford the waste of its time and resources that are inherent in vacillation and stop-and-start planning."

"Critical" Needs

Symington also described as "critical" needs:

1. A "radar fence" around the country to warn of air attack and direct the defense.
2. Additional housing for officers and men and their families to avoid loss of trained personnel who can't afford inflated civilian housing costs on their living allowances.
3. Unified medical services in the military establishment.

Yakima Ordinance Violators Point to City as Also Guilty

YAKIMA, Wash., Jan. 3 (AP)—Five persons, cited by police for failing to shovel snow off their sidewalks as per a city ordinance, fought back today with photographic evidence showing that the city is a violator also.

Frank Harrington, one of the citizens cited yesterday, brought pictures to the city hall today showing snow and ice on the sidewalk bordering the city's west side fire station.

Fire Chief W. K. Moore said the city does own the property and that the walks would be shoveled immediately.

Meanwhile, the cases against the five citizens were postponed in police court while the city fathers investigate the ordinance. Mayor N. K. Buck has termed the law as "unenforceable."

Yale to Set Up Scholarship As Memorial

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Jan. 3 (AP)—Yale announced today the establishment of a "living memorial" to its 11 students who died in the plane crash at Seattle, Wash., last Sunday—a scholarship fund for students from the Pacific northwest.

President Charles Seymour of the university said eight of the nine undergraduates who were killed in the crash (the remaining two were in graduate or professional schools) were scholarship youths. The balance of the fund of more than \$8,000 that had been awarded to them has been set aside to establish this new scholarship grant.

As tentatively planned, this memorial scholarship will be used for undergraduates who come from the states of Oregon and Washington.

Elderly Pair Wed At Cottage Home

William Kitchen, 78, and Pearl Roberts, 68, both of Mill City, were married Saturday morning at the Cottage home, 252 N. Cottage st. Joseph Felton, Marion county district judge, officiated at the ceremony, which took place in Kitchen's room at the convalescent home.

Mr. and Mrs. Kitchen will reside in Mill City after he recovers sufficiently to leave the home.

Triplets Born to Milking Shorthorn

HAYS, Kan., Jan. 3 (AP)—A 10-year-old milking Shorthorn cow at the Tom Drull farm near here gave birth to triplets Wednesday. Only one lived.

Dr. Foster Kordisch, veterinarian, said chances of a cow having triplets are 1 to 300,000. Chances of any of the triplets coming alive are 1 to 600,000 and of all of them being alive is almost unheard of.

The same cow had twins in both 1946 and 1947.

Crashed Fliers Survive Zero Cold, Rescued

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Jan. 3 (AP)—Another saga of the western sage unfolded today, this time with ranchers charging to the rescue in airplanes instead of on horses.

This modern thriller was complete with injured men, a battle with the elements, the rescuers becoming the rescued, and, finally, a missing man turning up in the nick of time to aid in the rescue.

It started with Jack Frost, veteran of the range, who took a herd of stock in to the high desert country 50 miles east of here Thanksgiving day.

Unusually heavy snow hit, and ranchers feared he did not have enough food to last out the weather. Harold Dyke, 22, and Ancil Church set out in a plane to rescue him Thursday.

They did not return and the ranchers mounted to their rescue. They mounted automobiles first, but the deep snow turned them back.

Tried Airplanes

Then they tried airplanes and from the air sighted wreckage of the Dyke-Church plane. The two fliers were injured, but had survived a night in sub-zero temperatures by pulling up sagebrush for a meager fire.

Allen Mocabee landed a ski plane within five miles of the scene. Elmer Henderson and John Griner brought in another plane, and Mocabee directed it to a dangerous desert landing on wheels in a bare spot. Then they set out on foot for the injured men.

Meanwhile Church began walking for help. There in the middle of the barren desert he met the man they had gone to hunt. Frost had holed up in a nearby cabin, where he found enough food to last out the bad weather.

Sent to Cabin

Frost sent Church to the cabin and went to the wreckage to take care of Dyke, who had broken a leg, broken jaw and had several teeth knocked out.

The fliers reached Frost and Dyke, improvised a sled and carried Dyke to Frost's camp. Other ranchers, using half-tracks, a bulldozer and a jeep broke through 40 miles of snow to reach the scene also.

They spent last night at the

camp, then Mocabee flew Dyke here today. Church, less seriously hurt, was brought in by the motor caravan.

The rugged Frost, who started it all, decided to stay in the desert with his horse and stock.

Draft Deferred as Enlistments Gain

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—With voluntary enlistments up, the army said today it will draft no men in either February or March.

A call for 5,000 men next month was cancelled.

Secretary of the Army Royal said voluntary enlistments and reenlistments have been averaging 35,000 a month, filling all requirements.

He added:

"As long as voluntary enlistments and reenlistments remain sufficient to maintain the strength of the army there will be no calls for inductions."

New Cold Snap Hits California

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 3 (AP)—A new cold wave moved on southern California tonight.

The weather bureau wasn't certain, but indicated it might be almost as severe as the one which early this week caused millions of dollars' damage to citrus, vegetables and cut flowers.

Effects of the coming snap will be felt before dawn tomorrow, the federal frost warning service predicted, with lows ranging upward from 26 forecast for Redlands and Fontana.

Salem Man On Relief Train

PORTLAND, Jan. 3 (AP)—A relief train carrying 75 passengers stranded in the blizzard area of Wyoming four days pulled in at the union depot here tonight.

There were smiles among the travel weary men, women and children despite their experiences at the hamlet of Egbert, Wyo., where the Union Pacific streamliner bogged down in drifts.

Among the arrivals was Harold Norton, Salem, who was met at the station by his father, Charles Norton, Salem.

Salem General Hospital Board Accepts Plan

Salem General hospital directors accepted Saturday a report of a citizens committee recommending a method for acquiring new hospital space for the city. No action has yet been taken by the Salem Memorial hospital board.

The recommendation called for a \$1,100,000 fund campaign, with the bulk of the receipts to go into a new general hospital building adjacent to the present Salem General plant, which would become a special cases hospital. Both would be operated by the Salem General board.

Memorial hospital would be granted \$100,000 plus 5 per cent of other receipts, for continuance of a current improvement and remodeling program. It would continue as a general hospital.

If both institutions approve the committee's report, it is expected that the fund drive will get under way within a few weeks.
