

Bribe Try Brings Indictments

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Indictments growing out of an alleged attempt to bribe a university player to fix basketball games were returned to New York and Washington today.

A New York county grand jury indicted all four of the men accused by David Shapiro, co-captain of the George Washington university squad, of offering him a \$1,000 bribe in connection with a Madison Square Garden contest.

The four are Jack Levy, 40, of Miami, Fla., and William Rivlin, 43, Joseph Aronowitz, 35, and Philip Klein, 34, all of New York.

In Washington, a federal grand jury indicted Levy, Aronowitz and Klein. Assistant U. S. Attorney John W. Finley said the indictments were based on offer allegedly made to Shapiro in a capital hotel last month.

BALTIMORE, Jan. 10.—(AP)—The purse for Maryland's Preakness race, one of the three racing features making up the triple crown, was cut from \$100,000 to \$75,000 added today.

In cutting \$25,000 off the Preakness purse, the Maryland Jockey club followed precedent set by officials of the Belmont stakes last month. The Belmont, another gem in the triple crown, will also carry \$75,000 added money this year instead of \$100,000.

The other top three-year-old event, the Kentucky Derby, apparently will continue its \$100,000 added value. Churchill Downs directors, meeting last month, set that figure for the May 7 diamond jubilee race.

No date was named for the 1949 Preakness but it probably will be run the latter part of May.

Gilstrap Will Retire as Head Turner Home

TURNER — Annual meeting of Turner Memorial Home board, a home on the cottage plan, for aged and retired ministers of the Christian church, was held January 7 at Davis hall in Turner.

Reports for the year were reviewed and a budget of \$24,575 for 1949 was adopted.

Elected as trustees for the coming year were Dean Schomaker, Fred E. Bates, Elery A. Parrish, William F. Morse and Ellmore J. Gilstrap. Dean Schomaker was elected board secretary, and Ellmore J. Gilstrap, superintendent.

Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Gilstrap, who have been the superintendent and matron, respectively, since it was organized in 1933 had presented their resignations November 9. This was a complete surprise to the board of trustees and the resignations were tabled until the annual meeting. Upon the request of Gilstrap, the resignations were accepted, to take effect next September 15. The board asked Gilstrap to continue as promotional manager after that date, and ratified the appointment of Mrs. Mildred M. Nedds as assistant superintendent during the remainder of Gilstrap's term as superintendent.

Mrs. Nedds, for the past 15 months has been serving in the capacity of office secretary and assistant matron.

During the years that Mr. and Mrs. Gilstrap have been in charge, the properties of the home have been built and beautified and values increased from a few hundred dollars to more than \$100,000. Assistance has been given to more than 80 elderly people and has become favorably known in a wide area.

Outlook for the future of the home is bright, and there is much optimism among the trustees as indicated at the board meeting.

Chicago Mart Grains Climb

CHICAGO, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Major grains advanced on the board of trade today, although the May oats contract dragged behind the rest of the market and closed with a small loss. Final prices were the day's highs on a last minute burst of short-covering.

The action of grains wasn't much help to soybeans and lard, weakest commodities on the board over the past few weeks. All lard deliveries sank to new seasonal lows, a decline which came in the face of government purchases of 11,000,000 pounds of cash lard.

Wheat finished 1/4-1/8 higher, rye was 1 cent higher, soybeans were 1 1/2-2 1/4 lower, and lard was 17 to 30 cents a hundred pounds lower.
