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Dried figs are a very good fruit for winter use, being liked particularly by children.

Dried figs add interesting flavor and good contrast in color to fruit salad, bowls. A suggestion is to add cut up figs to a jelled combination of orange, pineapple and canned peaches jelled in strawberry gelatin.

Tart apples and dried figs are combined in a salad by some women. You'd let the figs stand in water for a few minutes before snipping them into pieces with scissors. Mix with apples and cook as usual.

Upside down cakes can be made with figs and perhaps some dried peaches or apricots.

We have a favored breakfast fruit for winter that includes a mixture of dried fruits, stewed together and seasoned with some stick cinnamon and a bit of nutmeg.

Dried vegetables, beans, peas and lentils come into their own during cold winter days. We all know about baked beans of course, but not so many know about lentils and split peas.

Experts tell us that there's very little difference in beans soaked overnight and those allowed to stand in water for a couple of hours. One can eliminate the standing in water entirely by bringing them to a boil in fresh water several times. However the latest approved manner is to let the beans soak for two hours before cooking them.

Lentils make good soup when allowed to soak over night for two hours, then cooking slowly until soft. Along with some onion and seasonings approved by the family. Salt pretty well before serving.

Here's a recipe that makes a main dish on a cold night:

FRANK SUPPER SOUP

6 Franks
1 cup navy beans
2 quarts cold water
2 tablespoons salt
3 tablespoons bacon drippings
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup grated carrot
1/2 cup flour

Wash beans thoroughly. Drain. Put in saucepan and add water. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat. Add salt. Cover and let simmer until tender (about 2 hours). Heat drippings in small skillet, add onion and carrot and brown lightly. Add flour and mix thoroughly. Then slowly add 1 cup of bean liquor and cook until smooth and thick. Add this mixture to the bean soup. Bring to a boil. Add franks which have been sliced pennywise and continue to cook for about 5 minutes. Serve hot. Makes 6 servings.

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Recruiting Open In Woodburn Tank Company of Guard

WOODBURN, Jan. 10—Recruiting for the Woodburn/heavy tank company of the national guard will continue for an indefinite period, in order to bring the strength up to 93 men. Lt. James J. Anderson has announced.

Authorization was granted by Col. Fred Weigand of the regimental headquarters in Portland. Two new men have been signed, bringing the strength of the unit up to 75 enlisted men and three officers.

Eligible men interested in joining the guard are asked to see Sgt. Wayne Byrnes at E. J. Hughes the army Mondays through Fridays from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Saturdays from 8 to 11:30 a.m. Those unable to come in at these hours should see the officers during Monday night drill periods.

Young men 17 to 32 years old, are eligible for the guard and men over 32 with prior military service may obtain a waiver on the top age limit. All men with prior service may enter the guard at their discharge rate Lt. Anderson said.

Those who enlist in the guard before they are 18 1/2 years of age are eligible for deferment under the new draft law. Men over that age who have not received draft questionnaires and who are interested in joining the guard are asked to see Lt. Anderson.

New recruits signed last week were Pvt. George Arnold of Woodburn, a veteran, and Don Ballweber of Mt. Angel.

The unit's 16 m.m. training films will be shown in the near future, Anderson said.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 11 —(AP) It's getting so a truck driver is expected to be able to do anything — and usually can.

That was the lament of Luke Harrison, Woodburn, Ore., last night after rescuing four persons from a ditched automobile and then assisting in the delivery of a baby girl.

State Police Sgt. Lyle Harrell reported Harrison's truck was involved in an accident on Pacific highway 89 north of here. The car and its four occupants caromed off the highway and down a 14-foot embankment.

Harrison made four trips to carry Mr. and Mrs. Daniel William Collins sr., of Junction City, and their two and four-year-old children from the wreckage. Meanwhile traffic lined up behind the truck-blocked highway.

After the rescue, Richard Knight of Yoncalla, whose pregnant wife was in an automobile in the line of vehicles, appealed for help. Harrison, a father, knew it was too late to try rushing her on to Mercy hospital in Roseburg, 14 miles south, so he got busy. The hospital later reported the mother and the 7 pound 14 1/2 ounce child were doing fine.

Harrison's comment: "All in a day's work."
