Income Tax Returns PREPARED
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County Refuses To Rebate Dog License Fees

Marion County District Attorney E. O. Stadter advised the Marion county court Tuesday that it can make no rebate on purchased dog licenses and that no tax rebate can be made on diseased cattle condemned by the state.

The district attorney also advised the court, in a third opinion, that all money in the county dog control fund in excess of \$1,000 as of January 1 must be turned over to the county treasurer.

A farmer, living north of Salem, had petitioned the court for a return on personal property taxes paid on stock which had been destroyed by direction of the state Bang's disease control officer. The tax rebate would have amounted to less than \$10, if granted.

The court also was asked recently by a man for a refund on a \$2 dog license. The 1949 license, dated January 3, was purchased in December. The dog died on December 31. The unidentified man wanted his money back but Stadter's opinion blocked the rebate.

Maple Named In Suit Alleging False Arrest

A suit alleging false arrest and demanding \$55,000 damages has been lodged against Howard Maple, Salem business man and city alderman, by a Portland man.

William F. Cory filed the suit in Marion county circuit court Wednesday. He alleges that a complaint filed against him last November by Maple charging forgery, was false.

When Cory was arraigned for a preliminary hearing last October 4, hearing Marion County District Court Judge Joseph Felton dismissed the case. Cory presented evidence to show that at the time the alleged check involved was passed at a sporting goods store then owned by Maple, he, Cory, was aboard a ship in the Pacific.

Capt. Max Alford, state police handwriting expert, had identified the \$125 check as being written by Cory. The check was passed at Maple's store last July 13. A photostatic copy of a steamship passenger list, presented in court, placed a William F. Cory aboard the steamship Gen. M. C. Meigs en route from Guam to San Francisco from July 10 to 22.

Cory was arrested last September 20 by Salem city police on a complaint signed by Maple, according to court records. Maple recently sold the sporting goods store.

Attorney Steve Anderson informed Mayor Walter Musgrave, who had been instructed Tuesday night by the city council to determine the city's possible course of action, that Mrs. Brown, an elective officer, could not be required to perform duties outside those set by the city charter for her office.

Mrs. Brown did not open the city hall office Saturday, as she has done since 1947, when the 40-hour work week was extended to include Recorder Robert E. Pattison.

Rotarians Told Of High School On-Job Drills

How Salem high school students are getting on-the-job vocational training, especially to prepare those who do not go on to college, was discussed before Salem Rotary club Wednesday noon by the program coordinator and two students.

Theodore Pierson, coordinator, told about the cooperative part-time training program in operation here since 1931 and traced the history of practical vocational study.

In order to give the student something to "sell" in addition to his diploma, the program, said Pierson, provides a laboratory in a place of business, as well as training related to the job. The students attend classes in the morning and work in the afternoon and on Saturdays. Pierson said many students had found new interest in school after beginning the vocational program and learning their educational needs on the job.

Short talks by Richard West, who is doing radio repair work, and Beverly Wickstrom, who is selling in a clothing store, while studying distributive education, noted that the program gives students a chance to earn while they learn and that they had to acquire the job before they could begin the new type of training.

To make it an all-Salem high meeting, solos were played by Robert Wilson, saxophone, and Daryl Peters, Trombone, both accompanied by Virginia Benner. Principal Edward Carleton introduced the speaker, and Donald Jessop, director of instrumental music, introduced the musicians.
