Little Old Fashioned

Bread Pudding Can Be Simple, Sweet Or Become Sophisticated Dessert

Now take bread pudding, it can be just as plain and old fashioned as boiled custard or as sophisticated Baked Alaska, but plain or fancy, it's a mighty good dessert to remember in wintertime.

Here's the good old recipe. It's basic and can be varied considerably.

BREAD PUDDING
 2 cups stale bread crumbs
 1 quart scalded milk
 1/2 cup sugar or more
 1/4 cup melted butter or margarine
 2 eggs slightly beaten
 1/2 teaspoon vanilla or
 1/4 teaspoon spices

Soak crumbs in milk, when cool, add other ingredients. Bake one hour in buttered dish, in a moderate oven (325°). Serve with spiced cream or vanilla sauce. Custard should not be used in the dessert. If a firmer pudding is desired, reduce milk to two or three cups.

The variations are many. You can arrange banana slices over the pudding before baking. You can omit the white sugar and use 1 cup brown sugar browned in the butter instead to give a butter-scotch flavor.

Or to make a caramel taste, caramelize 1/2 cup sugar, dissolve in the scalded milk before soaking the crumbs in it. Serve this with whipped cream.

To have coffee flavor, you can dissolve four teaspoons instant coffee in the milk.

A cup of dates and 1/2 cup walnut meats may be added. One may add nuts and raisins, chocolate or fruits to the mixture to make an endless variety of desserts from this one basic old fashioned favorite.

By adding crushed pineapple you'll have a pudding that's a bit more sophisticated, and by topping the dessert with ice cream there'll be even more style.

Made in individual casseroles, the dessert's nice enough for company.

PINEAPPLE BREAD PUDDING
 2 cups cubed day-old bread
 2 cups milk
 2 eggs
 1/4 cup sugar
 2 tablespoons melted butter
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon vanilla
 1 8-oz. can crushed pineapple
 Soak bread in milk until soft-ened. Add slightly beaten eggs and other ingredients. Mix and pour into a one-quart casserole (or 6 individual casseroles). Bake in a moderate oven (325°F) one hour, or until an inserted knife blade comes out clean. Serve hot with vanilla milk, if desired. Six generous servings.

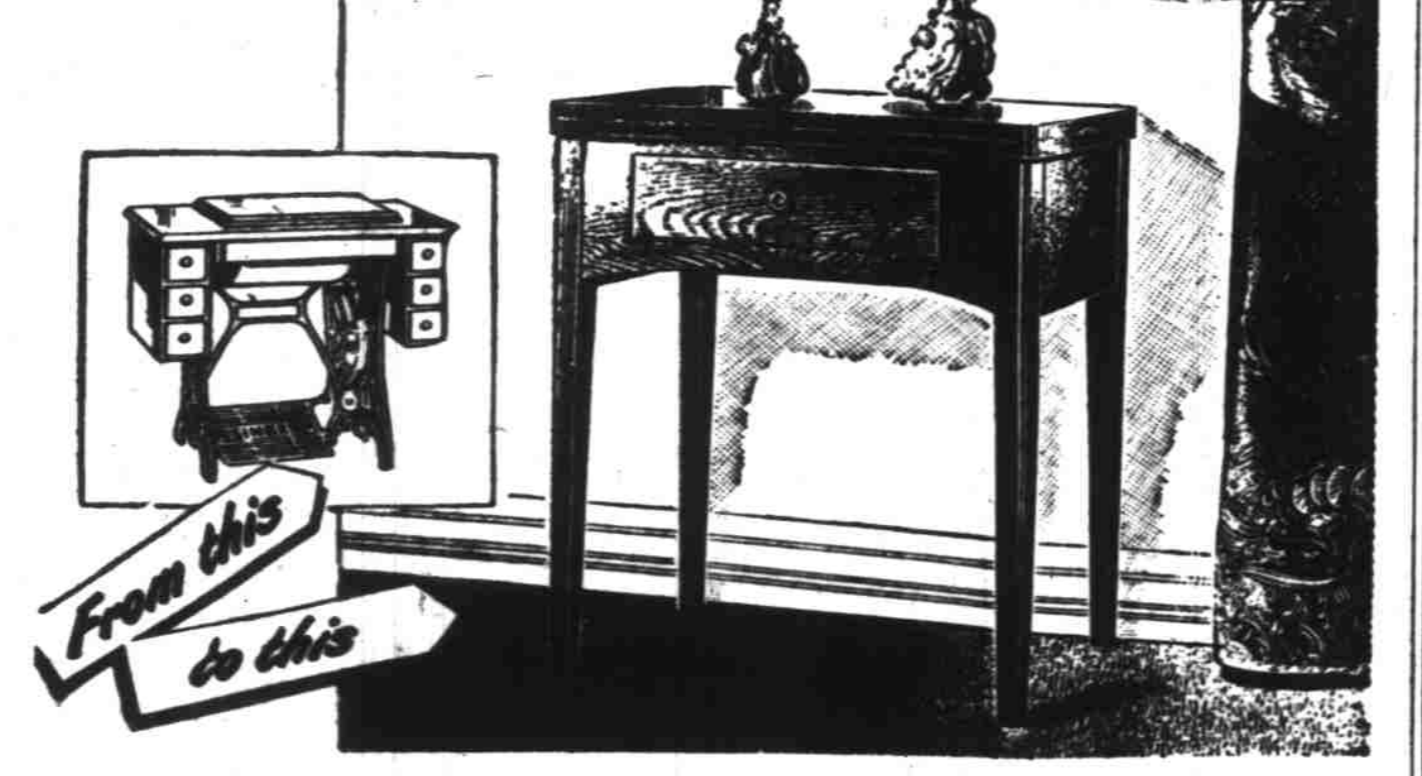
