

New Detroit School Opens, 183 Enrolled

DETROIT, Jan. 13 — The new Detroit grade school building occupied first when school reopened after the holidays, now has 183 pupils enrolled in eight grades.

Two buses operate on a fast schedule to bring the pupils from the nearby towns of Idanha and Mongold to the school and return them in the afternoon. The school was built by the U.S. army engineers to take care of the children of workmen employed in construction work on the Detroit dam.

Building L Shaped
The new school building is L shaped, one arm having a large play shed, three primary rooms, cafeteria, teachers lounge and girls lavatory. The other side includes the school offices, supply room and

eight class rooms. The library is at the corner of the L.

The school is located on a 10-acre tract back of Detroit on the site of Camp 17. John D. Cannon, high school teacher, operates the bus which picks up the children in Mongold, new town built by the engineers to house workers and their families and located west of Detroit on the highway.

J. A. Harris leaves Mary's creek with the bus and picks up children all the way into Idanha several miles southeast of Detroit on the North Santiam highway. When all are assembled in the new school building, a dream come true to the pupils, there are 183, now enrolled.
