Monday — Immunizations and vaccinations for children at the health department's Salem office in the Masonic building from 10 a. m. to noon and from 3 to 5 p. m.

Tuesday — Health examination for first graders and selected cases at Salem Heights school from 9 to 11:30 a. m. and from 1:30 to 3 p. m., and immunization clinic at Middle Grove school at 1 p. m.

Wednesday — Well-baby conference at Stayton in the Women's clubhouse (appointments by calling Mrs. Raymond Frey, Stayton, or Mrs. Arden Hammer, North Santiam); chest fluoroscope clinic (by appointment) at Salem Memorial hospital from 1 to 2 p. m., and an immunization clinic at Swedge school at 10 a. m.

Thursday — Immunization clinic at Garfield grade school at 9 a. m., child health conference (by appointment) at the Masonic building from 9:30 to 11:30 a. m.

Friday — Health examination for first graders and others at Scotts Mills and Crooked Finger schools from 9:30 a. m. to noon, and immunization and vaccinations for adults at the Masonic building, including milk handlers, 8:30 a. m. to noon and food handlers, 1 to 4:30 p. m.

Saturday — Immunizations and vaccinations for children and adults at the Masonic building from 9 to 11:45 a. m.

Storm-Stalled Mail Arrives

Magazines, packages and other mail, held up for the past several weeks in snow-bound mail trains, will be reaching Salem homes now, the Salem post office reported Friday.

A big backlog of mail, bottlenecked by storms and snows in the mid-western states, reached the local post office this week and is being delivered as rapidly as possible, postal authorities said. A number of complaints reached the post office during the past week from local residents who had not received expected mail and periodicals, it was reported.

Revised County Courthouse Plan Near Completion

A new set of plans for the proposed Marion county courthouse, incorporating recent changes and suggestions, will be in the hands of the courthouse building commission soon, it was reported Friday.

Pietro Bellusch, Portland architect assigned to plan the new building, met briefly with Marion County Clerk Harlan Judd as the architect passed through Salem Friday morning.

The new plans are to include a sketch of the building's outline as well as corrections and recommendations in the floor plans and office spacing, Judd said.

Retrials Due In Two Cases

Indictments against two men were dismissed in Marion county court Friday and the cases are to be resubmitted to the Marion county grand jury.

The two are Harold Joseph Johns, Salem route 3, charged with rape and William Harvey Haskin, Salem route 4, charged with larceny of lumber last October. Both men were indicted by the grand jury last December 16.

The grand jury is slated to meet again within several weeks, District Attorney E. O. Stadter said.
