

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 18 -(A) Oregon State fought from behind in the second half tonight to de-feat the University of Idaho, 69 to 53, and win both games of a Northern division, Pacific Coast basketball conference series here. It was the fourth straight loss for Idaho since entering Oregon last week to meet two conference rivals. The Vandals lost both games against Oregon last week and then two more here.

Coach Slats Gill's substitution of Big Alex Peterson as the second half opened was the spark that set off an Oregon State drive. It put the Beavers far enough in front that the Vandals never caught up.

Peterson banged in a goal withn one minute and in the next six minutes had added four more while team mates Glen Kinney and Dick Ballantyne were helping. When the spurt was over at the eight minute mark, Oregon State was leading 48 to 37 and the disheartened Vandals couldn't show the stuff they had in the first per-

The game opened with Idaho snatching an 8 to 3 edge before the Staters could organize. Then the Beavers tied at 8-8 and 10-10 with Ed Fleming and Glen Kinney setting the pace. But Idaho's Nic Stallworth, who shared Idaho scoring honors with Bob Pritchett on 11 points each for the night, sank a goal that turned the tide after the five minute mark The Vandals built to a 29-23 lead before OSC narrowed to the 30-28
