Harger, Loder Win Support of Salem C. of C.

Appointment of either Don Harger or James Loder to the state game commission will be recommended to Gov. Douglas McKay by Salem's Chamber of Commerce, as a result of a resolution adopted by the chamber board Wednesday night at its monthly session in the chamber office.

Harger is president of the Frank Walton league here and Loder heads the state wildlife federation. Directors of the chamber learned from past president James Walton and Chandler Brown that the two Salem men are under consideration for appointment to a game commission term beginning next month. It was understood the opening is to be filled from the Willamette valley area but that Salem has not had a member of the commission for several years.

The chamber board also went on record favoring adoption of the Columbia basin project, including the Willamette river project, as now drafted by the army engineers in this area. President Roy Harland and others of the chamber expect to attend a regional hearing on the project February 2 in Portland before a board of engineers for rivers and harbors from Washington, D. C. A \$35,000 budget, up \$2,500 from last year's, was adopted for 1949 by the chamber board.

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Fishing Gear Law Attacked In Court Suit

Motions were filed by defendants in Marion county circuit court Wednesday in a suit seeking to kill a recent law voted to outlaw fixed fishing appliances on the Columbia river.

The suit was brought by a group of fishermen on the river against the state fish commission and Arnie J. Suomela, master fish warden. Plaintiffs charge the law, passed at the last November election, is unconstitutional.
