

Gets 25 Years for Treason



NEW YORK CITY, Jan. 20—Former Air Force Lieutenant Martin Monti (center), 27, pleaded guilty to treason charges in New York City and was sentenced to 25 years in prison, and fined \$10,000. He was charged with deserting his post in Karachi, India, of hitchhiking to Italy, of stealing a reconnaissance plane, flying it to a German-held base near Milan, and subsequently of having broadcast propaganda for the Germans. Stock Prices Flip Forward

NEW YORK, Jan. 20—(AP)—A flurry of buying in the last few minutes of business flipped prices forward in the stock market today. The president's inaugural address was received favorably in the financial district but there was some disagreement over the question of whether the rally was touched off by the speech. Volume expanded on the late upturn. The day's turnover of 820,000 shares wasn't much to get excited about but was tops for the past week. Business Wednesday amounted to 750,000 shares. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks edged up .2 of one point to 66.1, the highest since Nov. 4 when the market was battered by a post-election selling drive. It was the fifth average advance in a row. Trading broadened to include 978 issues, high for the week. Of these 488 advanced and 233 declined.

Corn Steady In Grain Mart

CHICAGO, Jan. 20—(AP)—The only commodity on the board of trade which showed any steadiness today was corn. Everything else retreated and closed at the lowest price of the day. For most of the session price changes did not amount to much, although the independent firmness of corn while other cereals eased was an early feature. In the last half hour selling expanded and found few buying orders in the pit. Most of the day's losses were made in the final few minutes. Wheat closed 1 1/4-1 1/2 higher, corn was 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, oats were 1/2 to 1 cent lower, rye was 1 1/2-1 1/4 lower, soybeans were 1 1/2 to 2 cents lower and lard was 8 cents lower to 2 cents a hundred pounds higher.
