## Buren Serves As Temporary Deputy D.A.

Temporary deputizing of Peery T. Buren as a deputy district attorney to assist in drafting some legislation was authorized Thursday by Marion county circuit court. The proposed bills would amend laws which now pertain to Multnomah county but might soon involve Marion, Clackamas and Lane counties as they pass the 100,000 population mark.

District Attorney E. O. Stadter, who was also authorized to obtain necessary clerical help, told the court he had located about 80 sections of the Oregon code which might become effective here after the next caucus. Judge Grant Murphy said, however, that he thought only about 19 sections would require amendment.

The district attorney was placed in charge of determining which statutes must be changed and preparing proper corrective bills. It is proposed that sections now reading "counties over 100,000 population" be changed to read "300,000."
