

Morse, Pepper Clash on T-H Repeal Tactics

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25—(AP)—Senator Morse (R-Ore.) said today that his colleagues pushing speedy repeal of the Taft-Hartley law are "playing right into the hands" of southern democrats and republicans fighting repeal.

Senator Pepper (D-Fla.), a leader of the speed-up drive, reported: "We don't need a lecture from the senator from Oregon about how to run democratic affairs."

That exchange was part of the backlash from the senate labor committee's decision yesterday to wind up hearings on new labor legislation by February 10. The hearings will get under way Friday morning.

Scott Fights to Keep Post as GOP Chairman

OMAHA, Jan. 25—(AP)—Should the republican national committee rid itself of what one committee member termed "a symbol of the Dewey defeat" by naming a new national chairman?

That shaped up tonight as a major question to be answered during the national committee's two-day post-election meeting starting tomorrow.

Rep. Hugh D. Scott, Jr. (R-Pa.), named to a four-year term as national chairman after the GOP national convention last summer, claimed the support of at least 68 of the 105 committee members on the eve of the committee's post-election two-day meeting.

'Axis Sally' Weeps At Treason Trial

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25—(AP)—Nazi Germany's "Axis Sally," 48-year-old Mildred E. Gillars, wept at her treason trial today.

If convicted, the Maine-born defendant faces a possible maximum penalty of death in the electric chair.

The government pictured her to the jury as a traitress who served Hitler's Germany by telling radio listeners that World War II was a conflict of "Jews against gentiles."

Demand Made For 'Stand-By' Control System

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25—(AP)—The administration stuck to its insistent demands for "mandatory" anti-inflation powers as it pressed congress today for a stop-gap extension of the GOP's voluntary controls.

Secretary of Commerce Sawyer spearheaded the new drive to win capitol hill approval of President Truman's oft-repeated requests for stand-by authority to put clamps on credit, rents, exports and scarce commodities.

Sawyer told a senate banking subcommittee the administration soon will ask "mandatory powers" over distribution of steel and other essential goods in short supply.

Unit to Bring Employment For Reservists

The proposed navy reserve unit, practically assured for Salem, will need a number of full-time reservists on active duty, Wallace Hug, training officer for the volunteer reserve unit here, said Tuesday.

A list of the ratings, expected to be needed in Salem, has been received by Hug from Seattle, Wash., naval reserve headquarters. Hug has been instructed to take applications for the jobs and application blanks are to be available soon.

Ratings listed include one each of chief yeoman, second class yeoman, chief pharmacist, first class aviation store-keeper, chief aviation mechanic, chief and first class aviation metallurgist, first class aviation electrician, first class aviation radioman, first class aviation electronics technician and first class carpenter's mate, five each of first class aviation mechanics and second class aviation mechanics and three airman apprentices.

Confusion Reigns In China Capital

NANKING, Wednesday, Jan. 26—(AP)—There were indications today of dissension within what's left of the government at Nanking over abandonment of this capital city.

China's government appears to be changing its mind hourly.

While this was going on, the communist broadcast willingness to talk peace at Peiping—on their own tough terms.

There was no immediate indication the communist decision would halt the swift abandonment of this capital. Frantic thousands of citizens jammed trains and railway stations, trying to get out.

Auto Dealers Hear Kaiser, Gov. McKay

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 25—(AP)—Henry J. Kaiser told the nation's automobile dealers today there must be a "showdown" on credit controls that have cut automobile and home appliance sales. He addressed the convention of the National Automobile Dealers association.

Support of Fair Employment Bill Voiced

Representatives of church, labor and civic organizations gave strong support last night to the Oregon legislature's fair employment practices bill.

The hearing, before the senate labor and industries committee, was the first ever held in the senate chamber. Every seat was filled and many persons were standing.

The bill, introduced by 14 democrats and four republicans, would make it illegal for any employer, labor union or employment agency to discriminate against any person because of his race or creed.

The opposition was spearheaded by restaurant operators.

Ransom Meinke, Portland, attorney for the Oregon Restaurant association, said the New York state law, upon which Oregon's bill is based, "has become a big racket."

"This is a social problem," Meinke continued, "not a legislative problem."

The Very Rev. Thomas Tobin, Portland, vicar general of the Roman Catholic archdiocese of Oregon, and Mrs. David French, Portland, representing the League of Women Voters, came to the defense of the bill.

Former Governor Oswald West, Portland, said "Oregonians can take very little pride in their treatment of the colored residents of this state. The time has come to make amends."

Stanley Earl and James T. Marr, Portland, executive secretaries of the state CIO and AFL organizations, also supported the bill.

Load Limit Cut On State Highways

PORTLAND, Jan. 25—(AP)—The state highway commission Tuesday ordered a 50 per cent load limit on highways, effective January 27, to remove the danger of damage during icy conditions.

A load limit of 36,000 pounds, or an axle load of 8000 pounds, was ordered for several routes including the Cascade highway from Oregon City to Silverton and the Woodburn-Estacada highway from Kahler junction to Estacada.

Henry Lynch Rites Friday

Funeral services will be held at St. Joseph's church at 10 a. m. Friday for Henry Lynch, father of Dr. John L. Lynch of Salem, who died Tuesday at the home of another son, Harry Lynch, at Vancouver, Wash.

Lynch died on his 95th birthday. He was born in Wisconsin in 1854 and lived in Iowa, South and North Dakota before coming to Oregon in 1910.

Also surviving are two daughters, Mae Hoskinson, Eugene, and Anna Tarr, Cottage Grove.

Israel Election Quiet, Solemn

TEL AVIV, Israel, Wednesday, Jan. 26—(AP)—The men and women of the new state of Israel chose the first Hebrew parliament in history yesterday in an election marked by quiet and solemnity.

A high number of voters participated. Preliminary estimates said as many as 400,000 might have cast ballots.

The first returns—admittedly inconclusive—showed two powerful labor parties, one headed by Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion, in the lead.

Portland College Proposal Opposed

PORTLAND, Jan. 25—(AP)—The State Board of Higher Education turned thumbs down today on establishment of a junior college in Portland at the present time.

The State Board said educational needs could be met in Portland by buying a building and combining it with the work now offered at Vanport college and the general extension division's night classes.

The board said it would not favor a junior college here until money needs of other institutions are met.

Dr. David Hill Dies, Specialist In Orthodontia

Dr. David Bennett Hill, Salem orthodontist, who died of a heart ailment at a local hospital Tuesday, devoted most of his practice to children. He made a constant study of the care of children's teeth and was the author of several magazine articles on orthodontia, the science of dealing with irregularities in teeth.

Born at Helix, Ore., June 6, 1886, he attended grade and high schools in Pendleton. He graduated from the Denver university school of dentistry in 1912, and practiced general dentistry in Pendleton until 1927.

He was married to Mabel Jones at Pendleton, June 6, 1915. Following the marriage, the couple went to Chicago where Dr. Hill took special dental courses at Northwestern university. Later he took special courses at the Royal College of Dental Surgery at Toronto, Canada, and Bellevue hospital in New York City.

Before coming to Salem in July, 1927, he attended the University of Kansas City where he specialized in orthodontia. He maintained an office in Corvallis in recent years, devoting one day a week to his practice there.

Surviving besides his wife are a daughter, Mrs. Howland Lake, San Leandro, Calif., two grandchildren, Vernon Pomeroy Hill, Salem, and Catherine Lake, San Leandro, Calif.; sisters, Mrs. Robert Stanfield, Scarsdale, N.Y., Mrs. William H. Lytle, Salem, and Mrs. Howard Gattie, Portland; brothers, Henry Hill, La Grande, James Hill and Tom Hill, both of Pendleton; nephews, George Hill, Salem, and Gerald Hill, La Grande.
