Air Express Volume Grows

Statistics in connection with a 31 per cent increase in air express handled in Salem last year were announced Thursday by W. A. Link, agent for the Railway Express agency here.

The volume increase of 1948 over 1947, aggregating 31 per cent, added up to a gross revenue increase of 57 per cent. Shipments numbered 3,277 last year, compared with 2,489 in 1947. The overall national increase in air express amounted to 4 per cent.

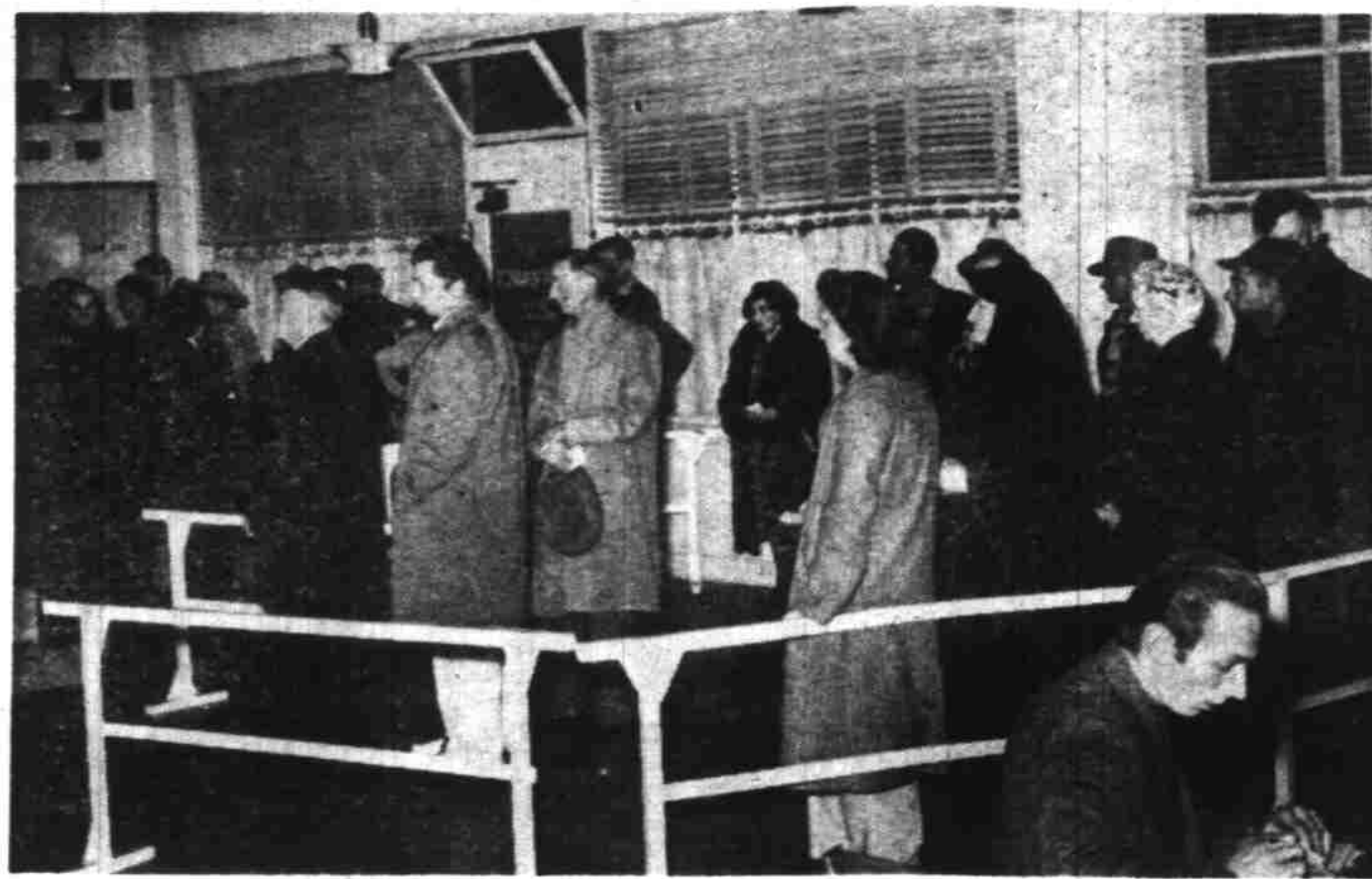

Moore Revues Tax Problems At Lions Lunch

How to raise state revenues with the "least burden on taxpayers possible" and still look ahead to even greater state government costs expected one or two bienniums hence is the problem before the house taxation committee of the current Oregon legislature, Chairman Ralph T. Moore of Coos Bay told the Salem Lions club Thursday.

The committee chairman declared that he did not favor using the entire surplus from income and corporate excise tax—an estimated \$500,000,000—in the coming biennium. Moore addressed the club's luncheon in Marion hotel.

Moore appraised present sentiment of the legislature as favoring only modification of the state withholding tax and as opposed to submitting any sales tax proposal in view of consistent defeat of such a tax by the voters. Moore added, however, that he still received letters strongly endorsing a sales tax and that many legislators felt if a sales tax is increasing in public favor it should be proposed through a voters' initiative.

Moore said using up all the tax surplus in the next two years might result in "shaking the very foundations of the state's credit" in the succeeding biennium, as the now-built-up tax surplus would be then exhausted and "there is no reason to believe government costs will not continue to rise."

The Coos Bay legislator said his committee is faced with a budget recommendation of \$175 millions as against anticipated revenue of only \$150 millions even if the entire tax surplus is counted. He said he expected that the state budget for 1951-52 biennium would probably rise to about \$190 million.

Other Considerations
The speaker also mentioned these considerations which face the tax committee and any approach to tax legislation: Oregon's total tax bill (including federal) is now nearly \$700 million against a total income of \$2 billion.

The pressure of local taxation is now tremendous.

Real property taxes "cannot be raised to any considerable extent."

Gradual assessment value increases will help eventually.

Much of the budget will not stand cutting, but "some compromise" will have to be attempted to strike a balance between expense and revenue estimates for the coming biennium.

After all these considerations, the committee will still probably have to formulate some sort of broad-based tax with the least burden possible on the taxpayers.
